During the rough framing portion of your house, you must provide for insulation, weather tightness and ventilation of your house. When framing corners where exterior walls meet, dead areas, inaccessible boxes develop. These boxes must be insulated as the framing of the walls develop. (A roll of unfaced fiberglass insulation should be enough for the average size house.) Cut strips of insulation slightly larger than the opening and pack into the corner cavities. Headers above windows and doors also have open space between the structural members. A header is two or more pieces of 2X6, 8, 10, or

Update: I am writing this 12 set on edge that span an openwall will carry. The header cavity should be filled with insulation.

> A building wrap, Dow's Tyvek, visqueen, or felt paper should cover the frame. I prefer Tyvek as that product will allow the passage of moisture but not air movement. This product was introduced about 10 years ago and was first applied on the outside of the wall sheeting. It was susceptible to wind and construction damage when applied externally. The current method is to apply Tyvek between the studding and the sheeting, this gives the product much more protection.

When exterior walls are fitted with windows and doors take some of the insulation and pack around the casings. Use a wood shingle and place the insulation from the inside using firm even pressure. DO NOT USE EXPANDING FOAM. Expanding foam will distort the window and door frames and apply pressure to the frames and units. Nothing worse than a window or door that cannot be opened or closed.

Floor and ceiling joist headers should be packed with insulation. Cut pieces of the insulation just slightly larger than the openings and staple the paper to the adjacent wood. Rafter openings need to have an air space between the insulation and the roof sheeting. Preformed cardboard and plastic panels are

available. If you have a vaulted ceiling, where the drywall is attached to the bottom of the rafter each cavity should be vented. Use either a continuous ridge vent or roof vents. I prefer a ridge vent system.

ety of products. Fiberglass both sided and unsided. Sided gives an additional air barrier if properly attached. Foam is available in sheets or applied on site in the cavities. Cost is higher but the insulation factor is much higher because the air cells are closed little bubbles of air. 
Financial Aid Meeting Set
