



There is still deadheading and some weeding to be done. When doing these, inspect the plants for damage from disease or insects. If the cause can be caught in the early stage, it is easier to control.

Fertilizer can be applied now to the lawn, garden plants, vegetables, bushes and trees. Don't forget monthly fertilizations of the containers of flowers that provide so much color in a small amount of soil.

It is time to start thinking about ordering bulbs for planting in the fall. Perhaps you can use the same blocks of colors No two men are alike, and both of them are happy for it.



The second film is a dramatic film that takes you inside prison walls to discover what "tough love" is all about.





#### Colic

Susanne M. Mammen, DVM Saline Veterinary Service The word "colic" strikes fear

in many horse owners. Many have experienced colic with their own horses and know all too well the anxiety they felt during those episodes.

With knowledge of what colic is and what can be done to cure and prevent it, the chances of survival increases.

What is colic? "Colic" means abdominal pain, which can result from a number of causes. The most common causes have to do with abnormal intestinal (gut) movement, which alters the movement of food and gas through the intestinal system. This abnormal intestinal movement can cause colic that is mild to colic that is severe and potentially life threatening.

There are four common categories of colic: Spasmodic or "gas" colic, obstruction or impaction colic, strangulation colic, and, displacement or torsion colic.

And, there are three categories of pain: mild, moderate and severe.

Signs and management of

More important than the types of colic are the signs the horse will be showing and what you need to do for each of the colics mentioned.

Spasmodic or "gas" colic

Signs: Your horse will show intermittent signs of mild or moderate pain and he may try to lie down and roll. He may pass gas or feces during this episode of colic. Normally horses have gurgling noises that are heard from the intestines. You can hear these noises by placing a stethoscope along the side of the belly behind the ribs but in front of the rear leg. In this case,

Management: If your horse is laying down quietly let him be. If he is not better in 30 minutes, call your veterinarian. If the horse is lying down and rolling, call your veterinarian, then walk the horse (it may stimulate passage of gas.) Until your veterinarian arrives, continue walking your horse (if he continues to roll) and keep him as quiet and comfortable as possible

the gut sounds (gurgling) are in-

#### Obstruction or impaction colic

Signs: Your horse will show intermittent signs of moderate pain which may become more severe as food backs up in front of the impact. Your horse may also try to dog-sit and you will hear lessthen-normal gut sounds.

Management: Call your veterinarian immediately. Walk your horse until your veterinarian gets there in order for him to stop hurting himself while he rolls and thrashes. Never walk your horse if he poses a danger to you.

#### Strangulation colic

Signs: Your horse will show severe signs of pain and possibly shock. There will be an absence of gut sounds.

Management: Call your veterinarian immediately. Walk your horse if he poses no danger to you, otherwise let him be.

#### Displacement or torsion colic

Signs: With a displacement colic, your horse may at first show mild to moderate pain which usually progresses to be quite severe. With a torsion colic, your horse will show severe, violent, uncon-

trollable pain wih signs of shock. Management: Call your veterinarian immediately and walk your horse only if he poses no

If the colic warrants your veterinarian to look at you horse, be prepared for your veterinarian to ask you a lot of questions about your horse's history and current condition. He/she will evaluate you horse's condition, vital signs, color of the gums, capillary refill time, gut sounds and level of pain. He she may also perform a rectal exam (will help in assessing what type of colic it may be) and may also pass a nasogastric tube to either relieve some fluid and gas within the stomach and even to pass medication (for example mineral oil and water).

#### **Prevention**

Anything that alters the horses' intestinal movement puts him at risk for colic but many things can be done to minimize this risk.

First of all make sure you have your horse's teeth checked at least once a year and have any necessary floating done. Proper chewing of hay and grain greatly minimizes the risk of impaction

On the same lines, feed your horse high quality feed and hay (free of dust and molds) and feed him at the same time every day, dividing his regular ration into 3 or 4 small meals. Other good colic minimizing tips include providing plenty of clean fresh water - not frozen, de-worming your horse properly (proper amount and regularly), no strenuous exercise at least 30 minutes after a meal. avoid feeding on sand, do not let your horse engorge himself with lush green grass and keep the grain bin secure to avoid grain over-

#### **Chocolate Toxicity**

It's a fact! Chocolate, loved by as well as the type of chocolate so many of us, is toxic—a poison to your dog. Theobromide and caffeine are the toxic ingredients which, if ingested in large enough amounts, can produce many symptoms and may cause the death of your pet.

In dogs, these symptoms include vomiting and diarrhea, depression, lethargy, muscle tremors, seizures and excessive urination. The caffeine content may cause excitability and restlessness. Death may occur by cardiac arrest.

The quantity of chocolate that dog depends on the animal's weight, treated the better!

consumed. Unsweetened or baking chocolate contains higher levels of theobromide than milk chocolate. For example, for a 10 lb dog, about one ounce of baking chocolate or 10 ounces of milk chocolate is a lethal dose.

If your dog has helped itself to your chocolate candy, notify your veterinarian immediately. Treatment consists of delaying the digestion and absorption of the chocolate, speeding its elimination and providing supportive care for doggy treat. may cause such symptoms in your the dog. 

Some discussion was held regarding ambulance response times and new fire contracts.

They were held in March and in October of 1951, and sponsored by the Michigan Department of Health in conjunction with the Red Cross. These earliest blood drives collected 127 pints and 91 pints, respectively, and were staffed by Manchester volun-

The first Community Blood Drive, in February of 1953, was chaired by Mrs. Franklin (Claire) Reck. Nearly


