







With that kind of tribute we are truly loosing a valuable asset to the community.



time of year to start the cleaning of the flower beds while still deadheading to encourage more

flowers for the next few weeks. Getting rid of the debris, the dead leaves, dead stalks and some flower heads is important to good sanitation and a healthy garden.

The blotches and spots (leafspot) that show up on some Iris leaves are caused by bacteria and fungi that can remain over the winter and be ready to splash onto the new leaves in the spring to continue the cycle. It doesn't harm the Iris by cutting off the badly disfigured leaves. The clearing away of the dead leaves and stalks will also discouraged the borers from overwintering. The debris should not be put on the compost pile.

Some plants such as Monarda, Lambs-ears, Daisies and Yarrow can be tidied for the winter by cutting the stalks down to the basal leaves.

Other plants such as "Autumn Joy" Sedum, Hydrangea, Yucca and Caryopteris (Blue Fringe) can be left with the seed heads intact for the winter beauty. In the early spring, the dead Sedum plant can be pulled away to make room for the new growth, but the Caryopteris has to be cut to the ground since flowers appear on the new growth.

Cutting back a portion of the plant including the flower heads is desirable for those flowers that could become too numerous and turn into weeds. It is easier to remove the seds of Coreopsis, Gaillardia and Anthemis now than to remove the small scatted plants next spring.

While deadheading certain plants to encourage more flowering, hopefully, enough ripe seeds will drop to provide seedlings for next spring. I can count on reseeding from Sweet Alyssum, Foxgloves, Snapdragons, Pinks and Sweet Williams while deadheading this summer for more

It is a personal decision on what are "weeds" and what are "flowers".

2. Business In the Classroom: Consolidation of schools and opening up the school buildings to the community will help to facilitate the formation of business partnerships. Whenever possible, businesses should be encouraged to contribute time, rather than just money. Involving business people in the classroom would have a much greater impact in the long run, as they could share their experience and expertise with students and can help them to understand the importance of education on their future careers. Having a "real" business person tell a class what it takes to succeed will be remembered a lot longer than it will if it comes from a teacher.

would more businesses consider striking up a partnership; the fact that incentives would be provided to encourage these partnerships would recognize their importance

to the education community. 3. Teaching Teachers: Business has a lot to offer teachers, not only ins~e the classroom, but outside as well. A training program should be developed that will bring teachers into businesses so they can learn first-hand how the world of work is changing and why the skills identified by business as critical skills are necessary for students to succeed. Businesses take full advantage of the latest technology that

most schools don't have access to and teachers need to know about. They can learn in industrial labs; can experience teambuilding, quality control techniques, and the application of computers in the work place; they can learn how a product is produced and marketed; and how math, science and reading skills go back to the classroom with a much better idea about how the students will use the knowledge they are in school to attain, and can impart the importance of the necessary skills using real-world examples.

This type of experience should be required for all guidance counselors, as they are charged to help students make career decisions and need to have a thorough knowledge of how business needs are changing and what skills are required for each occupation.

4. Local School Board Ac-

tivity: Local school boards should be retained as the local component of the consolidation plan. Having freed them from the responsibility for funding through SB 1, they can focus on quality education initiatives within their school. Instead of conducting incessant millage elections, they will be free to initiate business partnerships; develop comprehensive teachertraining programs; evaluate weaknesses in their school and identify ways that the school can be improved; find ways to get more parents involved in their child's education, and coordinate community use of the school building. MMA believes that school board members would welcome these focused chalare used in business, so they can lenges, which most likely motivated them to run for office in the first instance.

The more involved the community is with their local school system, the stronger and more accountable the school will become.


