

When Rebekah Jackowski learned the Heimlich maneuver a few weeks ago in Health Class, she never dreamed she would be using it in a dramatic rescue



Rebekah was just sitting at the bakery after school last Wednesday, "telling Sandy about my Science Fair project", when suddenly they noticed three-year-old Brittany Boughton choking on a piece of hard candy. Her grandmother, Bonnie Colter, was trying desperately to dislodge the candy by hitting her on the back, and turning her upside down. Unfortunately, this was only helping momentarily; as the piece became dislodged, Brittany would breathe in and the candy would get stuck again.

Rebekah "just wanted to help Brittany," and remembered the instruction she had received in Ms. Gay Perry's health class right at the end of the last marking period. While Bonnie quickly took Brittany's jacket off, Rebekah grabbed her from behind and performed the Heimlich on her. The candy came out right away.

"It was great that Rebekah knew what she was doing," said Sandy King. "Brittany could not breathe at all and it was very frightening. I had dialed 911 while Rebekah began helping. Fortunately, it wasn't needed."

Toes: They help the feet balance the legs that support the

Legs: Provide the locomotion to move the body from place

Body: Hooks the legs, arms and neck together providing linkage for the physical portions of our anatomy.

Arms: Allow the grasping of objects for examining or procurement of fuel to sustain the other parts of the anatomy.

Head: The head is at the top of the body and has several integral parts that perform specialized functions. Sight, so that we can observe and record visual observations that may help sustain the body and enhance the control center called the brain. Hearing, records sounds that are used for communication between bodies and recognition of outside influences. Mouth, that ingests food for fueling the body and communicating vocally. Property Tax Exemption forms

On or about February 7, 1994 the Michigan Department of Treasury will be sending a copy of the "AFFIDAVIT FOR HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION FROM SOME SCHOOL PROPERTY TAXES" to every mailbox in Washtenaw County. These forms must be filled out and signed by the taxpayer claiming a homestead exemption and filed with the township or city where the their property is located. The instructions to fill out the forms can be found on the back of each form. The most important part on the form is the correct PROPERTY TAX IDENTIFICATION NUM-BER. There are several ways that this number can be found, they are

1. On your most recent tax

2. On your assessment change notice.

3. From your local assessor or supervisor.

4. From the Equalization department, except for Ann Arbor City, Ypsilanti township and Scio Township.

In the event that you do not receive a form in the mail and you feel that you are entitled to this exemption your local unit has received extra copies for just this purpose.

quired. Often, we find that a better explanation of our practice and the rationale behind it is sufficient to alleviate a citizen's concerns. Other times, we determine that a policy or practice requires change, and we do so.

In the second instance, a complaint about an employee, we will conduct an inquiry to determine exactly what happened and whether the employee acted properly. In many cases, we discover a misunderstanding that is cleared up after both the complaining citizen and the employee are consulted.

Unfortunately, sometimes people complain about a deputy in order to avoid paying a ticket-or-answering to a criminal charge. When this happens, we immediately separate the issues so that one case is not used as leverage to affect the status or outcome of the other.

Other times, we find that an employee has made a mistake or has acted improperly. In these instances, we apologize and take corrective action which may require a policy change, additional training and occasionally, discipline.

In all instances our primary purpose is to provide the best in public safety services. If you have a compliment, a complaint or a suggestion to better your Sheriff Department please let me know. As our purpose is to serve you, your input is essential to assure that we are fulfilling our mission:

Viewpoint

Has the state taken over raising all revenues for local schools even though it has taken over more control of the operation of local schools? NO!

Our leaders have lead us to believe that all school operating funds will come from the state, and local school districts will no longer be in the millage business. Don't let them fool you! Locally-voted property tax dollars will stiil be needed to fund

Your school district will have to ask for a millage increase if it:

* is not currently operating under a voter-approved, multiple-year millage. This means many school districts will need to have a millage vote after the March 15 statewide election to maintain their level of spending

*is currently spending more than \$6,500 per pupil and wants tomaintain its level of spending. * wants to build a new school or remodel an existing building.

* wants to improve current educational opportunities including computer technology and instruction so our students can be competitive with those in other countries.

* is currently spending its savings to maintain its educational programs. Very little revenue from a school district's savings has been applied to the state's guarantee of \$4,200 per

* has expenditures which grow faster than revenue allows

. * becomes overburdened from paying employer's share of FICA (social security) and state's share of retirement costs for employees — a significant cost, recently shifted from the state to local school districts. which will only increase as teacher's salaries rise and educators retire.

If local millages are not approved, cuts may be made in transportation, equipment purchases, current basic educational programs—reading, writing and arithmetic, extra-curricular activities, hours of operation, afterschool programs, hot lunches and even custodial services and building maintenance. As we saw with Kalkaska last year, schools may even close.

Indeed, property tax reform in Michigan will not save homeowners as much money as expected. Property taxpayers will still pay the price — either by approving local millages or reducing the quality of education for our children.






