School Board Makes Decision at Discipline Hearing August 3

Student **Expelled**; Courts Next to Act

Manchester Board of Education held a special meeting on Wednesday, August 3rd. The main item on the agenda was a resolution and disposition of one of the students who willfully damaged the middle school. Those damages are in excess of \$31,500. The special meeting was convened in a closed session at the request of the parents of the Manchester student. (We at the Enterprise will not disclose the name of the student or his family).

Manchester's Board convened their session and heard a report from School Superintendent Ron Niedzwiecki of damages. A letter from the parents was on file. The board reviewed a video tape of the damages. After the conclusion of the closed session the general meeting was reconvened and the motion was made in open session to permanently expel the student. According to a board member: "Because of the severity of the student's actions, we as a board had very few options. We felt that the only viable solution was the expulsion of this student so that another school. That will be after his arraignment with the Juvenile justice system.'

We know that the decision by the board, although unanimous, was not without

misgiving. It is always sad to have to pass judgement on a student for actions that need not have occurred.





Manchester Going to the the day at work anyway. Dogs?

River Raisin can have a dreamlike tranquility. With the humidity and stillness of the air permitting the birds' songs to echo through the woods, one in peace. I yell for the dog to can relax at the breakfast table and let the day's plans crystallize. One can wind down in the problem: dogs tied up outside, evenings listening to the wind in the trees and kids playing down the street. It really is very the-hill must have got his leash peaceful here — this is why I moved here, this is where I want ing, just howling. to live.

But this year the quality of life on Auburn Street has not been quite so nice. The following abbreviated log for the past 10 days has been typical so far for the summer. I present this somewhat personal log to the community as a first step in a desperate attempt to restore peace and quiet to the neigh-

Friday, July 22. End of a work week of 10 hour days. Get home at 7 PM, sit down in the sun room to relax and read the paper. But Dog-up-the-hill decides to have a barking frenzy. I can't relax to this. Go out for a few hours. Back at 9 PM, still barking. Take a shower, hear the barking in the shower — the sounds penetrate every corner of the house. Barking continues: 10PM, 11, 12. Intermittent now, just when I think "OK, quiet at last," it starts again. Intermittent even at 1:30 AM and beyond.

Sat, Sun July 23, 24. OK days. Gone half the time, but pleasant days with usual neighborhood sounds, including dogs barking as I would expect when owners are playing with them

Mon July 25, 3 AM. Dogon-a-long-leash up the street decides to start barking. This is a very still and humid night, any light sleepers within a quarter mile, with the windows open are now awake. Some yap-yap dog joins in. The duet continues until 5 AM. Back to sleep. 6:45 AM, Dog-up-the hill starts whining, howling and barking. Get up and go to work. What a pleasant way to start the work week!

Tue July 26, 3:30 AM. Dogon-a-long-leash up the street starts barking again. Same story as yesterday.

Wed July 27, Nice day. That's one in a row.

Thur July 28, Oh, I don't know, about 4 AM. You guessed it, Dog-on-a-long leash up the

Sun July 31. Worked until 7 PM, some end-of-month dead-Summermornings along the lines to meet. Pull into the driveway about 7:15 and I'm greeted by a Dog-up-the-hill barking frenzy. I can't stand this. I'd like to read the Sunday paper shut up. But the owners are not home — this is basically the owners away.

> Keep in mind, however, that other people on my street work the off shifts, and their logs, for the same time period, as they attempted to sleep through the morning, would be less pleasant to read than this one.

> > My first question is, of

course, what do I do? Yes, I've talked to the owners; and the owners have heard, I'm sure on more than one occasion, one of us neighbors yelling for their dog to shut up, so they are aware that there is a problem. (I should express the fact here that all of the owners implicated in the log above are very nice people and are, themselves, truly ideal neighbors). But they have no idea what goes on when they are gone. I don't want enemies of these people, I just want some peace and quiet.

Second question: Does Manchester have some kind of ordinance that applies to the situations described in the log above? Is this ordinance so vaguely defined, such as in using phrases like "excessive barking" (how much is "excessive"?), as to be ineffective or unenforceable. If we have a vague law that needs rewriting, I'll volunteer to start a draft of a new one.

This ordinance could be objective and quantitative in nature: a person who has gathered his own evidence, on video tape for example, presents the tape to a judge, who, with a stopwatch, determines the cumulative times for the performances: "X minutes of barking while the owner is away — that'll be a Y dollar fine." (The gathering of one's own evidence will be necessary since dogs' barking is not a police emergency.)

My final question is a combination legal question and opinion poll: do these dogs have some kind of "right" to permit them to disrupt the lives of the humans around them? Tell me, when the owner is away or sleeping and the dog is barking, who in society is benefiting from this activity? I think, not the Sat July 30, OK. Dog-up- owner. My objections are to the owners who tie up the dog and forget about it or go away - only to let the neighbors suffer from the myriad of hideous sounds that only a miserable dog can make. Am I wrong? I'd like some feedback from the community.

Back to the immediate problem. As a last resort, I'm sure that I can put together enough video tape with calibrated sound meters and date and time stamping on the frames to overwhelm a judge and jury in a lawsuit — seems excessive, but if I have to do it, I'll do it.

Any suggestions? Anybody else in the same boat? I'd especially like to hear from people in the Village legal department. Any Vets out there who have had any experience with the ultrasonic collars or speakers to deter barking? Sharon Township Clerk Duane Haselschwerdt thought that their roughly 20% turnout was "not bad for a primary" in their locale. Sharon Township is in a different district for County Commissioner, so the contested race was not an issue there.

In Bridgewater Township, Karen Weidmayer felt they had a "very poor turnout" of 190 voters, out of a total of 914 registered, although the race for 8th District County Commissioner did include Bridgewater.

An unusual feature in this election was the write-ins . According to Weidmayer, "we had more than usual, in the 55th District (House of Representa-

tives, State Legislature.) People were coming to us, trying to figure out how to do the writeins." Explained Haselschwerdt, "Herbert Moyer no longer is willing to run for the Democratic nomination, due to health reasons, but his was the only name on the ballot. A write-in campaign was mounted for Georgene Campbell." In Manchester Township, Campbell received 22 votes; in Bridgewater, 5 votes; in Sharon Township, 2; and in Freedom,

Most of the Manchester area's election results closely followed "official" vote tallies in the county and the state. Local "favorite son" candidate John Hochstetler had a strong showing in the district-wide results, although ultimately coming in second to Joseph A. Mikulec, Jr. Local politician Lana Pollack, though a clear winner here, was narrowly defeated statewide by Bob Carr for the U.S. Senate

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals or free milk. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additiona copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school.

NON FOOD STAMP HOUSEHOLDS: An application which does not contain all of the following infornation cannot be processed by the school: (I) monthly source of income received by each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.); (2) names of all household members; (3) social security number of adult household member who signs the application; and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

FOOD STAMP/AFDC HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" (AFDC) for your child, you only have to list your child's name and Food Stamp or AFDC case number, and sign the application.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and verifying data. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If children are approved for free or reduced-price meal or free milk benefits, the household must report to the school increases in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in household size. Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time. In most cases foster children are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced-price meals or milk for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy Supervisor will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. The household also has the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Jan Lillie, 710 E. Main St., Manchester. Each school and the Superintendent's Office have a copy of the complete policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

In the operation of the child feeding programs no child will be discriminated against on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.
