



The ultimate goal of in house suspension would be to see students remaining in school but not being in detentions or in house suspensions. Ms Call said; "We expect to see a lot of kids in the in house suspension program, until word gets around that this is not the place to be."

Also they are implement ing a system to keep track of the students - the detentions they serve, the in house and out of school suspensions that occur. By tracking these incidences they may be able to detect behavior problems and in turn help the student.

Workshops are being planned. If you filled out the survey that came home with your child's report card, you have helped. In house suspension is one aspect of the at risk program, workshops are another. All of these are used to promote schools and families working together to support students. Helping the students succeed is really what this program is all about.

Marsha Chartrand's fine story about the Haab brothers and their Pleasant Lake Hardware Store brought back memories, since I grew up at Pleasant Lake, attended the school mentioned in the article, and even cast my first vote in the old town hall where my father, Will Reno, who was the township clerk

for many years, counted ballots until late in the night after each election.

One item, though, I would like to add to the story: On the outside walls of the Hardware Store one can still see traces of original church windows, because after the Freedom Evangelical congregation consolidated with the church at M52 and Pleasant Lake Road, they ceased having services in this building, and later it was moved south a half-mile (from the place where its cemetery is still in use) to the site of what later became the Haab brothers' Hardware Store. The congregation left in the 1920's.

After discussing my letter printed in the February 8, 1996 issue of the Enterprise with Mr. Diedrich, please print the following clarification:

Mr. Diedrich, as a member of the Technology Committee of the Manchester Community Schools, was led to believe that the computers for the high school drafting lab would be delivered in March of 1995, well before the end of school. This would have allowed him time to learn the new software before the end of school. The date had to be delayed, since the funds for he computers were in the 1995-96 budget, not the 1994-95 budget. This meant the purchase order could not be issued until July 1, 1995, well after the summer vacation had begun. Like most teachers, Mr. Diedrich is not paid to work over the summer and generally is not at school until classes resume in the fall. He did, however, come to the school on occasion to check on the progress of the drafting room changes. The computers were delivered to the high school on July 17. Since the drafting room remodeling had not been completed, the computers were placed in temporary storage in another room. Mr. Diedrich was not aware the computers had been delivered until late August, when a training system was set up in his office (the remodeling still

(2) Re-adoption of entire Zoning Map.


(3) Re-adoption of entire Zoning Ordinance Text with typographical and procedural errors

(4) One new amendment is added, this being Article 3 General Provisions, Section 3.11 Access to Public Streets paragraph B, is changed to read that an access easement of record can now serve 4 dwelling units instead of 2 and not more than 1 principal structure other than a dwelling unit in the A-1, R-C or R-2 Districts. Farm operations and buildings are exempt from this provision. In addition all access easements of record in commercial or industrial districts will be subject to site plan review.



Holiday Traditions What's a Paczki?

It's not just another donut!

People may not agree on how to pronounce them, gathering up to gobble up Paczki on Fat Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday. Emigrants of Poland pronounce them "Pooch-key" or "Punchkey" or even "Poonch key;" all are correct.

These round, sugar coated, fruit filled Polish pastries were

served up annually on the day before Lent, a period of abstinence observed by Roman Catholics. Originally, Paczki were made for practical reasons, to use up the lard and eggs which were prohibited during Lent. Now, they're more of a last-minute binge of sweets before the sacrifice. Whatever the past, all enjoy the tasty treat of Paczki, which means "Little Package" in Polish.

The new world version, like the old, is an extra large doughball, rich in egg yolks and deep fried, just like a donut.



Paczki! And don't ask about the calories; you just don't want to know.

Paczki on Paczki Day are becoming what chocolate is to St. Valentine's day and what pumpkin pie is to Thanksgiving racy, many of them right-wing suas many people share them with friends, families and co-workers. In previous years, bakeries claimed Halloween as the traditional season that sold the most donut treats, now areas of the country show that "Paczki" sales surpass even their #1 bakery sales holiday of Christmas.

Mardi Gras History and **Traditions**

in French) is another name for the Christian holiday Shrove Tuesday. Mardi day. Gras as we know it has been celebrated for as long as three centuries, but there have been celebratory feasts around this time of year for much longer. The rituals of Mardi Gras symbolize the beginning emon or of a new year, the transition from winter to summer, and the conflict between death/rebirth and darkness/light.

New Orleans' Mardi Gras began in filling of the 1740s with grand balls marking the prune. end of Carnival season, on the eve of Then it's Lent. It was the birth of the h ewe system - with the unexpected appearance in 1857 of a stately moonlit procession calling itself the Krewe of Comus, Merrie 0 0 % Monarch of Mirth - that really gelled quality or Mardi Gras in New Orleans, bringing together the populist street festivities and gold the elite social functions. Initiated by a group of Anglo-Americans, the idea of secret carnival clubs was taken up enthusiastically by New Orleans aristocpremacists who after the Civil War used the shroud of secrecy to mock and undermine Reconstruction. About sixty different krewes now equip colourful floats, leading processions on different often mythical - themes. These themes, (usually an older, politically powerful

Mardi Gras (meaning "Fat Tuesday" man and debutante), are completely unknown outside the krewes until the big

> Not all krewes are aristocratic; there are women-only krewes, "populist" ones open to anyone who can afford to join, and also three important black groups. The best known is Zulu, established in 1909 when a black man mocked Rex. King of Carnival, by dancing behind his float with a tin can on his head. They now parade in grass skirts and war paint. The eerie torch carriers of Comus parade at night, hooded and in flowing smocks, sparking bitter debate about whether the servile role demeans blacks, and the Mardi Gras Indians dance and chant in elaborate feather headdresses.

> One important Mardi Gras ritual is the flinging and catching of "throws". Beads, beakers and doubloons (toy coins marked with the insignia of individual krewes) are scattered amongst street revelers. Souvenirs vary in worth; the bright, cheap strings of beads that adorn balconies everywhere are least valuable, but the coconut handed down from the float of the Zulu krewe is worth its weight in

The two weeks leading up to Mardi Gras are filled with processions, parties and balls, but excitement reaches fever pitch on Tuesday itself, after a great, free, public masked ball in the Spanish Plaza the night before. Shambolic walking clubs open the day, playing raucous jazz as they stride through the city.
