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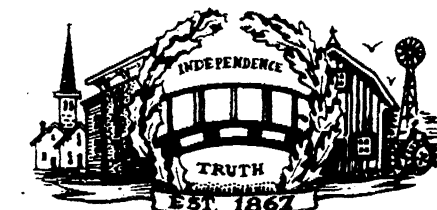

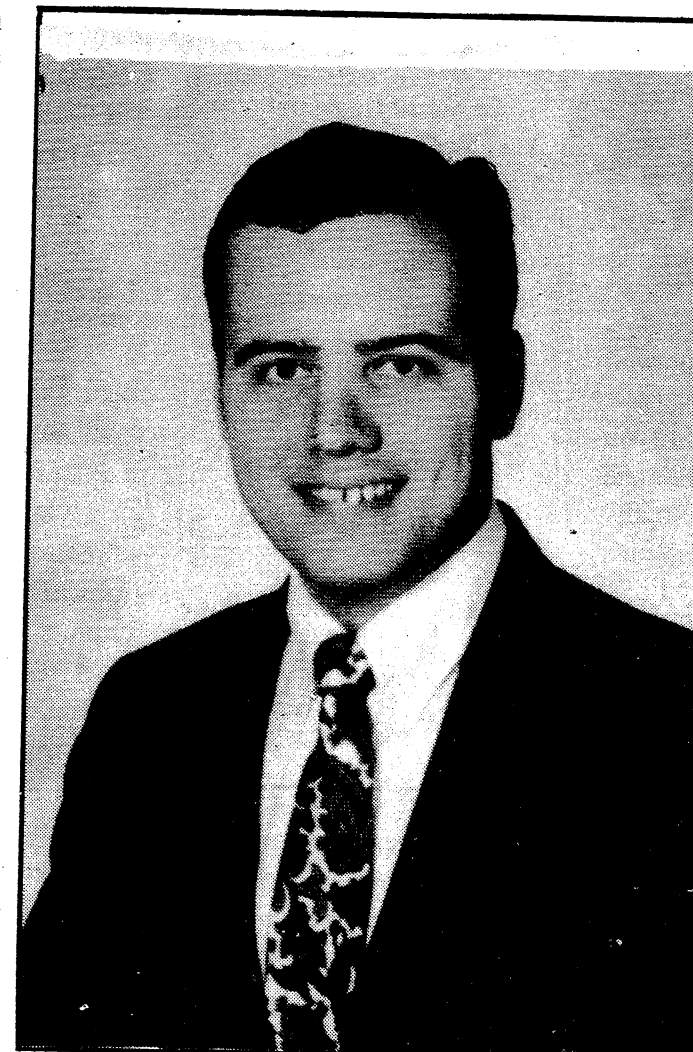

## Dr. James Watson, DDS

### Open Wide And Smile!

Dr. James Watson has moved "up the river" to establish his practice here in Manchester. Originally from a New Boston, Michigan family of nine children, he wanted to stay close to the rest of his family. Driving through Manchester last summer, he realized that here was a place he could eventually call "home."

In December, Watson purchased the practice and the equipment from Dr. Robert Conlin, who had a satellite office in the professional building at 122 West Main. Although he still lives in Belleville so that he can commute to both Manchester and his other job in the downriver area, he has joined local service organizations such as Optimists and the Men's Club, and intends to settle here as the practice takes more of his time and energy.

In his "other life," Watson works in a 20,000 patient clinic doing dentistry for an HMO. "There I see a patient every 10-15 minutes," he explained. "But there's no replacement for the doctor-patient relationship which can develop in a small, private practice." His ultimate goal is to develop his Manchester practice to full-time and become an active member of this community. He'd also like to settle down, get married and buy a home here.

"I really wanted to be in a small town," said Watson, "and within a 30-50 mile radius from my family." His mother has lung cancer; although she's doing well now, this influenced his decision to remain close by. Manchester fulfilled both wishes. "I feel lucky that I was able to purchase this practice," he continued. "Dr. Conlin was really very nice to me. It's expensive, and a tough road to begin a new practice in this time. Larger practices and HMOs are the coming thing for dentistry. And for a small-town boy like me, who had no real connections, things really need to fall into place. That's happened in Manchester."

Growing up in downriver New Boston, Watson decided early in high school that he wanted to be a dentist. Being from a large family, he realized that he'd have to rely on himself to succeed. He at-

tended Michigan Christian College for two years before transferring to David Lipscomb University where he knew they had a 75% acceptance rate to medical school. "They're very old-fashioned and conservative down there; more 'Ivy League' than the Ivy League schools are today," explained Watson. He applied to dental school, was accepted everywhere he applied, and ended up at U-M, graduating in 1993. He was active in student assembly, on the student/faculty relations committee of Delta Sigma Delta, the dentistry fraternity, graduated with honors, and received the coveted award in orthodontics.

Getting through school was no easy job, either. "I cleaned toilets, I hauled in carts at Meijers; I worked my tail off to make it through school," he related. This got him prepared for the busy schedule he keeps to this day. He works six days a week;

four full days at the clinic, two full days in Manchester (including Saturdays), and has evening appointments on Mondays and Tuesdays to accommodate his working patients. He purchased the patient records from Dr. Conlin with the practice, so has established families who have welcomed him.

Clinton resident with a year-old daughter, Kylee, Lisa was an honor student in Clinton, and plans to continue her education by taking classes at Washtenaw this fall to become a registered dental hygienist. "Lisa won't tell you all of this, but I don't mind telling you," said Watson. "She's smart and motivated and I'm

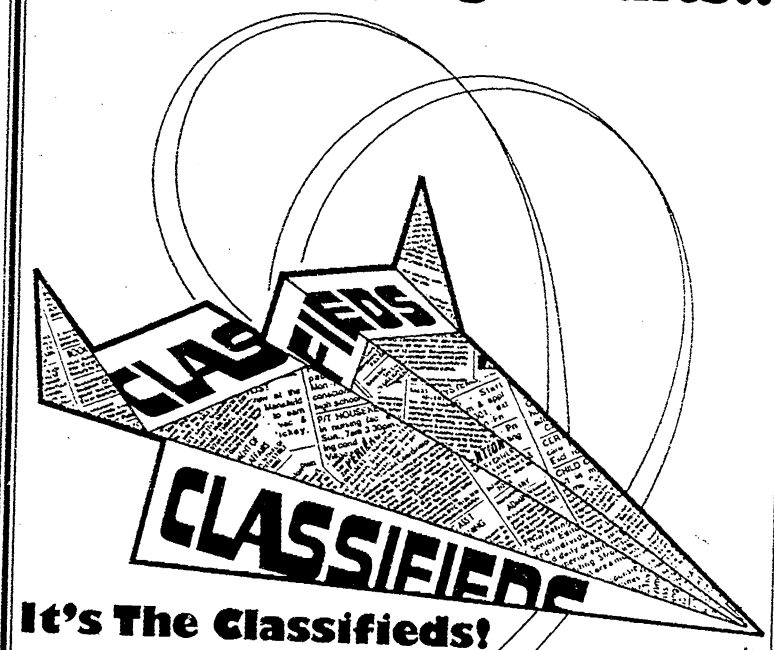
very fortunate to have her in my office. Your staff will bring in the new patients, and Lisa is very good at this." Lisa, in turn, appreciates that Dr. Watson will let her work her schedule around Kylee's needs and says she's learning a lot by helping out in the office.

An optimist and an individualist, Dr. Watson is also a self-confessed sports-aholic. "When I went to college I played baseball, but now I play hockey. When I get home, I turn on ESPN and that's about it." He has lots of plans for his practice in Manchester and eventually hopes to return to school to study for his Masters in Public Health, and work on changes in the American health care system. Basically, he just wants to provide "quality dentistry, with good doctor-patient rapport, in a regular, traditional practice."

Having seen both sides of the coin by working in the large city clinic, this is the side he wants to cultivate. He's satisfied with the growth he's seen happen so far and is booked a week or two in advance - a good sign for the future of this "new" practice. Working in partnership with his patients as he plans, he will see more growth.

Dear Editor:

I am both a relatively new citizen of Manchester and a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I was very dismayed when I heard and read of the horrible signs which were placed around the community which attacked our law enforcement personnel. The signs read: "THE MORE DECEASED POLICE OFFICERS THE MORE FREEDOM IN AMERICA." One of the members of the church which I pastor is a police officer, and he is one of the finest men I know. In fact I have known and worked with many law enforcement people through the years and I have the utmost respect for them.

I would like to remind those who are responsible for the signs in question that freedom without restraint is anarchy. True freedom must of necessity have boundaries or else it is not true freedom. For if one person exercises unrestrained "freedom" and subsequently brings injury to another's person or property, that so-called freedom is no longer freedom but a crime, both against a person and against society. For "freedom" without restraint means that each individual can do whatever they desire without concern for others. We must have laws and people to enforce those laws in order to maintain a truly free society. A nation without laws to restrain wrong-doing will become like ancient Israel as described in Judges 21:25, "In those days there was no king in Israel: every man did that which was right in his own eyes." I would also express to these individuals that there are no perfect people in this world. I am sure that no law enforcement officer would honestly profess to be perfect. Yet they are rightly held to a higher standard than other people in society because of the position, power and responsibility which they hold. Neither are they above the law itself. However, because a particular police officer may be guilty of wrong-doing does not mean that all police are "bad." Law enforcement personnel are human too. And I personally believe that most of them try to do a good job.

Please bear with this extended quotation from the Bible: "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God. Whosoever

therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation. For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? Do that which is good, and thou shalt have praise of the same: For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain: for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience's sake. For this cause pay ye tribute also: for they are God's ministers, attending continually upon this very thing," Romans 13:1-6.

Obviously, the person or persons responsible for these signs have a serious problem. If the things which they do are good, then why are they afraid of the police? They wish to "eliminate" police so that they can engage in their ungodly activity and crimes without consequence. Their very actions indicate their evil intentions. I personally, hope that these individuals are identified and confronted with their wrong attitudes and actions. I would also encourage these individuals to read the Gospel of John in the Bible. For the Almighty God can change anyone through faith in Jesus Christ as Savior.

I would also like to express my appreciation to all those who are law enforcement personnel. They work to help protect our individual freedoms. Their presence provides a certain sense of security. They often work in situations which endanger their own lives. They are often unappreciated and sometimes even threatened with violence. And when people post signs like those being referred to in this letter, the officers must be affected by mixed emotions. I am personally sorry that someone in our community would do such a thing. Certainly, most of us are glad our officers are here. Shouldn't we be able to consider the police to be our friends?

I plan to personally deliver a copy of this letter to both the Sheriff's office and State Police office here in Manchester. I hope that it will be an encouragement to them as they serve our community. Sincerely, Pastor Jon King

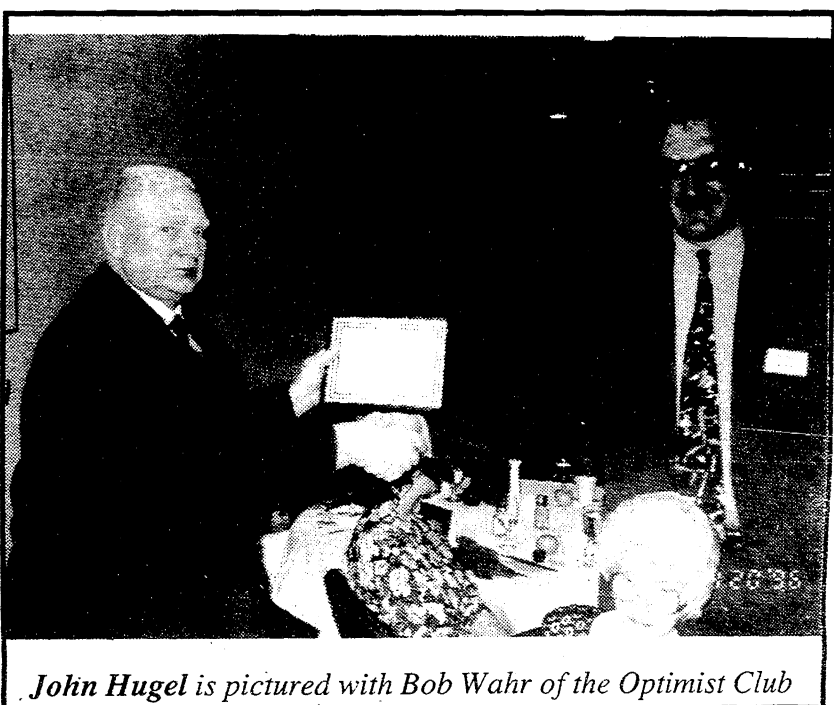

### School Personnel Files Available to The Public - Court Rules

In a recent issue of the "MASB Headlines" which is a publication by the Michigan Association of School Board there was an article about two recent court decisions clarifying that personnel files of teachers and administrators are open to the public.

In one case, a parent group in Lansing requested copies of the performance of nine principals and vice principals. Administrators filed suit to prevent disclosure on the grounds that evaluations were exempt from disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act and that collective bargaining agreements required that districts exempt such evaluation from disclosure. The court rejected both of these arguments.

In the second case, a parent requested information about his child's teacher in-

cluding reports of disciplinary actions against the teacher, changes in classroom assignment and liability insurance policies covering the teacher. The teacher filed suit to prevent the disclosure of this information to the parent. In this case the courts again affirmed that information of this type must be disclosed to parents, if requested.

P.A.S.S. is a parent/teacher support group in Manchester. One of our goals is to "pass on information". We primarily collect information describing learning differences and about accommodations which can be used to help students be successful, but we also collect information about legal issues related to education. The next meeting is May 15 at 7 PM at the Emanuel Church.

## BREAKOUT

On Friday, May third, Manchester Middle School's fifth through eighth graders participated in an all school assembly about drugs and alcohol. This assembly was presented by the Breakout program.

At the assembly Breakout members talked about drugs and what happens to you when you take them. They also talked about the effects of drugs and what they do to your body. Animation, Electronic Music, Bio Technology, Computer Aided Design ("CAD"), Computer Graphic Design, Controls and Sensors, Desktop Publishing, Exploratory Electronics, Engineering & Stress Analysis, Flight Simulation, Video Production, and Weather Satellite.

"Hold on to the Night" was the theme for the 1996 Junior/Senior Prom. It was held at Dusseau's just south of Ida, Michigan.

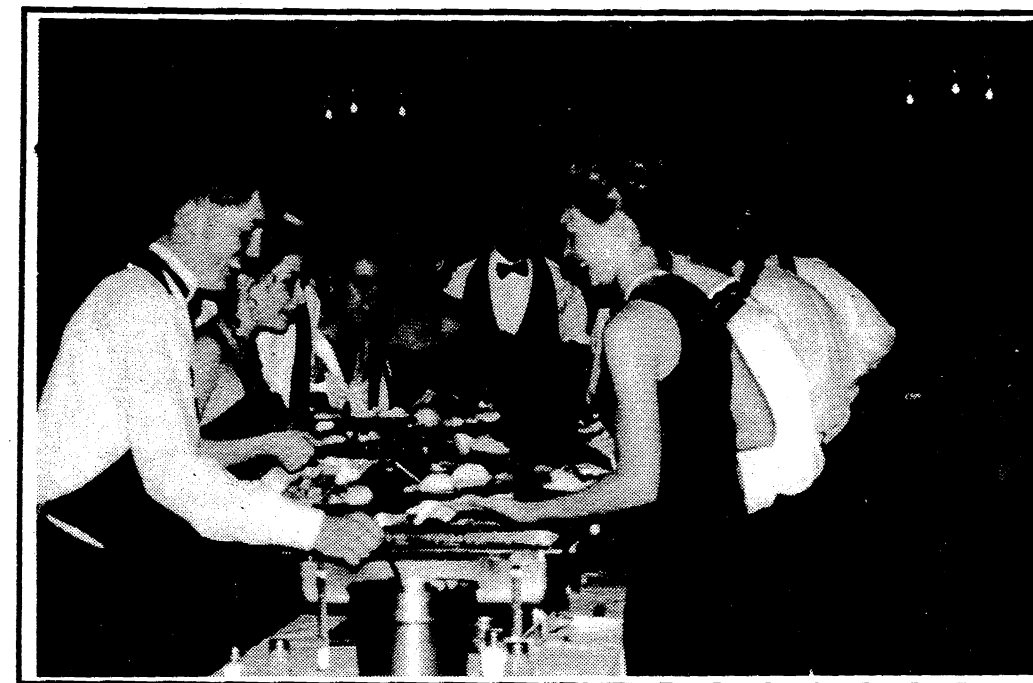

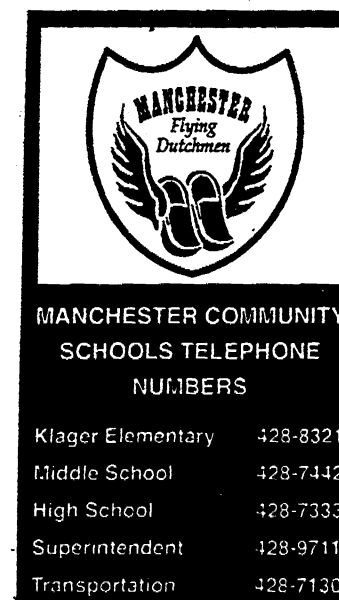

### Baseball & Softball Warming Up



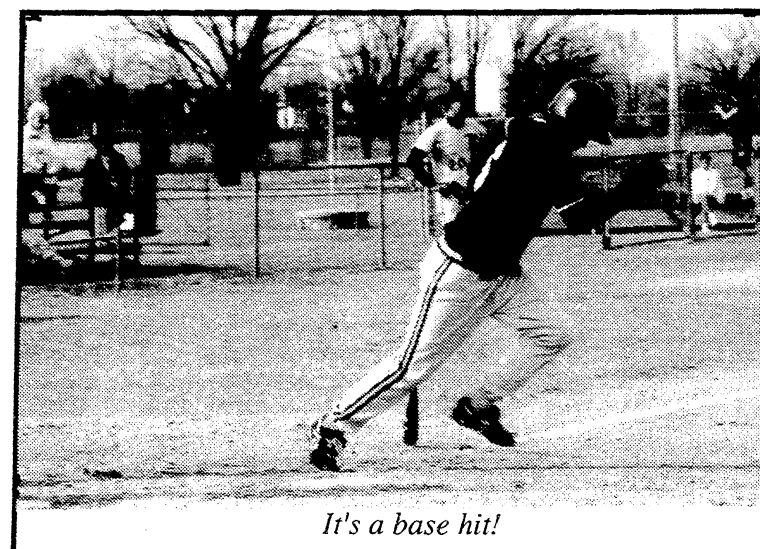
#### JV Baseball

Then it was on to the Var-

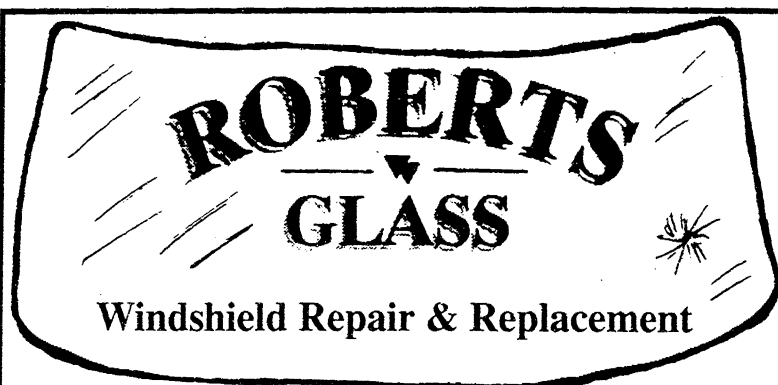

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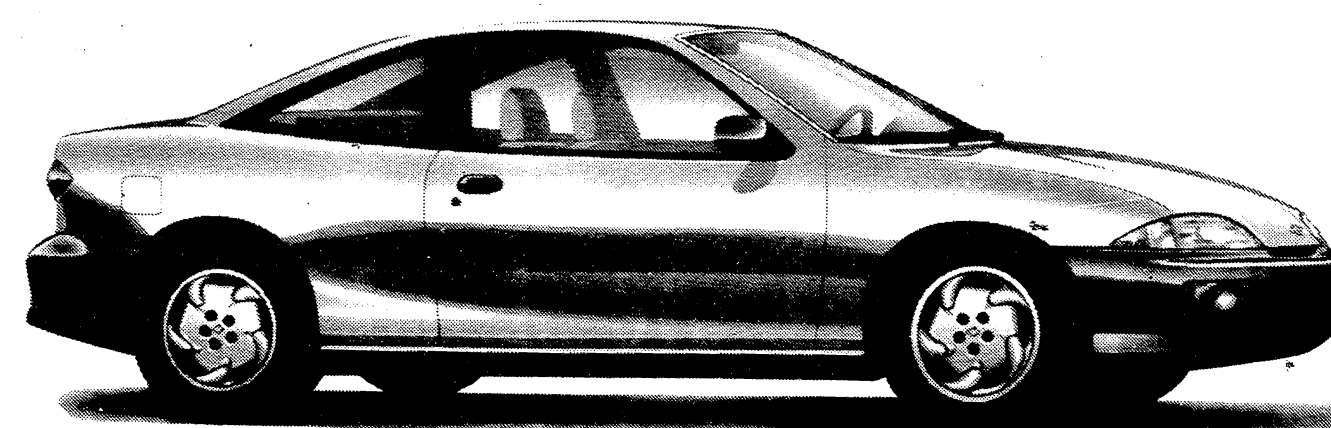
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## Citizen Honored

# Education Leader Elvira Vogel to Receive WCC Award of Merit May 18

Commencement at Washtenaw Community College this month will honor a local citizen who has dedicated her life to providing academic opportunities for everyone in Washtenaw County. **Elvira Vogel** of Manchester will receive the WCC 1996 Award of Merit during commencement exercises Saturday, May 18. The award underscores Vogel's dedication and devotion to the idea of education for all people, an apt description of her life's work.

Elvira Vogel's association with WCC began over 30 years ago when she joined other community leaders to charter the

college. Over the years she has served on a number of WCC committees including millage committees, the 1975 Presidential Search Committee, and the WCC Manchester Advisory Committee.

She has also been a champion of special education and continues to be an advocate for students with special needs. For 31 years, she served as a member of the Washtenaw Intermediate School District Board of Education before retiring in 1989. She began her tenure on the board in 1958 when she completed the term of former board member Horace Whitney. She went on to

be re-elected to five, six-year terms, serving in every capacity from trustee to president. While a member of the WISD board, Vogel also served on the Board of Directors of the Michigan Association of School Boards. Among her many MASA assignments, she served two years as chair of its Education and Curriculum Committee and chair of its Inservice, Conference and Seminar Planning Committee. Her lifelong dedication to education was recognized in 1992 when the Washtenaw Intermediate School District Board named the new WISD Conference Center in her honor.

When she was not attending board meetings, Elvira Vogel worked with many local services agencies, including the American Red Cross and the Washtenaw United Way. The Manchester High School Building Committee, the Manchester United Way Drive and various committees of the Manchester Fair Board have also benefited from her tireless energy and support. Vogel set a precedent when she became the first woman to serve on the governing board of her local church, Bethel United Church of Christ. She has also served on two national church boards and on the Michigan United Church of Christ

conference committee. Her commitment to her church was recognized in 1990 when she received the Michigan Women's Fellowship Woman of the Year Award sponsored by her church organization.

Over the years, Elvira Vogel's enthusiasm for WCC has taken her into the classroom where she and her husband, Lou Vogel, continue their studies and reinforce their belief in lifelong education. Vogel recently shared her experiences with WCC staff when she addressed them as keynote speaker of the 1996 Employee Recognition Luncheon.

## ARE YOU READY FOR MANCHESTER'S 30th ANNUAL CANOE RACE?

Sunday, May 19th marks the date for a Manchester tradition - the 30th annual amateur canoe race. This event is organized and sponsored by the Manchester Recreation Task Force as well as numerous other sponsors which are named on the canoe race flyer and posted around town. Usually, the river is a quiet, serene place to be, with the gurgle of the current and the lapping of water on the side of the canoe, an occasional rustle of an animal peeking out from behind a bush and of course the serenading of the various songbirds. The day of the race changes that serenity for just a few hours and things get back to normal by evening.

The very first time I was in the race, I had not been in a canoe in 15 years. I entered the race with high hopes of getting a trophy with my son, who was only 5 years old at the time. The day was beautiful and since we rent canoes for the race, we had to wait until the last canoe was bunched before we started on our journey. Everything was going along just fine, when all of a sudden a huge storm started

approaching. There was thunder, lightning and lots of wind. Of course, most of the other racers were already at the finish line and the Marine Patrol came by to warn us of the impending storm. At that exact moment, it was like the sky opened up and buckets of rain came pouring down. My son was really frightened, and the marine patrol had a two man jet ski and subsequently took my son to the finish line. I finished the race with the sheriff and as we made our way to the finish line, the rain stopped and the sun came out again. Just my luck!! While we were paddling away in the pouring down rain, I was still in awe of the beauty of the river. I am sure that anyone who has ever been down the river, either in the race or just on a leisurely float, agrees a difficult to find a place as beautiful as the river we have been blessed with right in our own backyards.

On May 19th starting at 12:00 noon the first canoe will be launched at Fellows Bridge and every 3 minutes until all contestants are on their way. At

the finish line, contestants will find themselves cheered on by the throngs at the finish line on the bridge on Main Street.

Fellows Bridge is located two miles west of M-52 on Sharon Valley Road and east of Sharon Hollow. Nestled in a valley, cars and canoes start arriving around 11 AM to receive their numbers and check in with race officials. This year, like years past, Sharon Hollow Acres Canoe Livery will be renting canoes for the race and will be there to assign you a canoe, paddles and life jackets. The fee for the rental canoe is \$15. The fee for the race is \$8 per adult, children are free (preregistration). The entry fee increases the day of the race to \$10. Proceeds from the race go toward funding local youth activities and is one of the most important yearly fund-raising events. Thanks to a host of volunteers and Bill Schwab, the race comes off smoothly and professionally.

Last year, over 68 participants competed in six different categories. The same holds true for this year. One of the favorite categories is the Adult/Child, the one in which a father or mother spends quality time and teaches the art of cooperation with their son or daughter. There is also a Women's category, Man and Woman, which often bring in the quickest times; Choose Partner, Competition and Single Canoe/Kayak.

Bill Schwab, race coordinator, has once again made it easy for contestants to participate. Of course, those who have participated in the past will receive their application in the mail. Race coordinators truly appreciate those of you who get your applications in early!! 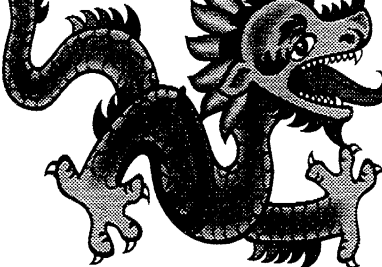

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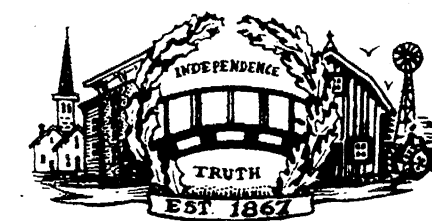

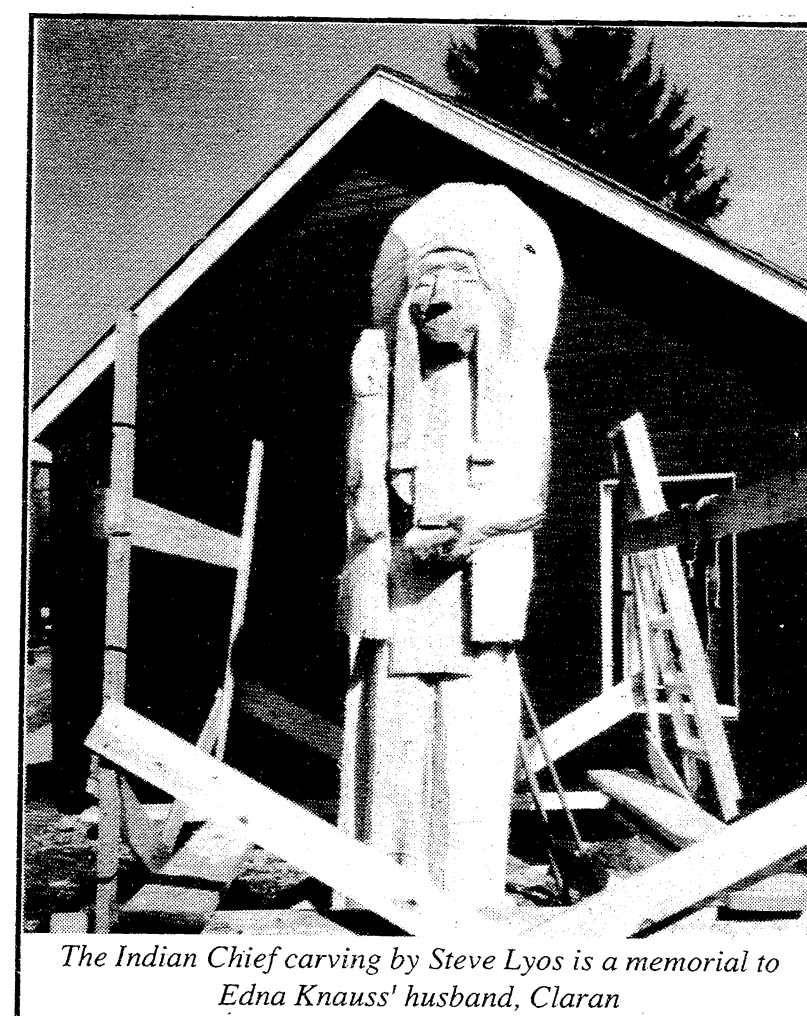

## Keeper of the Corner

A stately pine tree in front of Edna Knauss' home on Riverside Drive has been dying for several years. Time came for it to be removed, but Edna wasn't willing to see it leave entirely. "I wanted to protect the house from an oncoming car," she explained.

The tree has stood at the corner of Riverside and Beaufort as long as anyone can remember - including Edna. "We've lived in this house for 63 years, and it was an old tree when we moved here. I wouldn't doubt that it's over 100 years old."

When Gary Widmayer from the Village crew notified Edna that they would be cutting down the tree, she requested they leave 6-10 feet to protect the house. "But I realized it wasn't going to do much good just sitting there," Edna recalls. It was then she decided to contact Steve Lyos, a Manchester resident, to carve a design into the remainder of the tree.

The Indian Chief that is now emerging from the tree trunk is a memorial to Claran Knauss, Edna's husband. "He had a large collection of artifacts and he liked that motif," explains Edna. Their son and his wife now live in Watersmeet during the summer and they had always noticed these Indian carvings during their visits north.

"Steve showed me his album after I had read about him. He has done a lot of smaller works, which he sells at craft sales," Edna relates. "He works strictly freehand and refers to dimensions on a grid. This art is totally natural to Steve." Edna explained that she had suggested the Indian but left the actual design to him.

Turn down Beaufort and park to take a good look at the Chief. We wouldn't want you to get into a crash while admiring the artist's craft.
