

### **Bethel Church Breaks Ground for** new Education Addition

The raindrops stopped just in time and the skies cleared at 4:00 on Sunday afternoon for the Bethel Church Ground breaking ceremonies. The \$310,000 addition will include educational classroom facilities. multi-use rooms, a great hall and a new kitchen. An elevator unit will also be in the addition which is located on the west wing of the church.

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
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### JV Baseball

Elvira Vogel's association with WCC began over 30 years ago when she joined other com-





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
