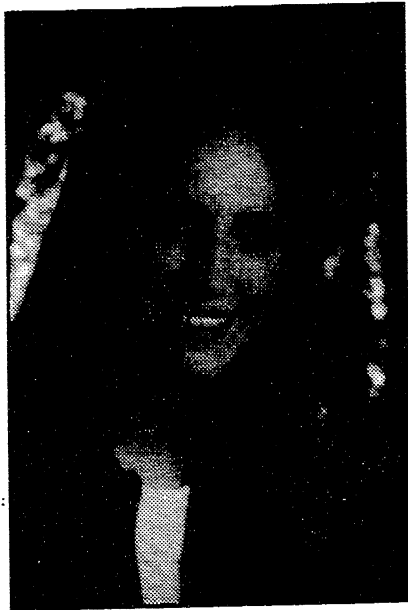

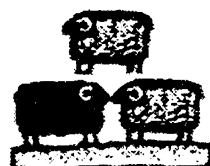

Michigan Week

Michigan Week celebration gets underway May 17

Secretary of State Candice S. Miller, Michigan's official historian, is reminding Michiganders that the state's annual Michigan Week celebration will be held May 17-26 this year.

Michigan Week is a unique annual celebration that began in 1954 and quickly became the largest mobilization of grassroots boosters trumpeting Michigan as a wondrous place to work and live. It celebrates Michigan's heritage and promotes state pride among citizens.

The annual celebration, now in its 43rd year, is the time set aside by gubernatorial proclamation to recognize Michigan's historical, cultural and natural legacies. For the second consecutive year, the celebration will be co-chaired by Secretary Miller, Michigan's official historian, and Dr. William Vandament, President of Northern Michigan University.

According to the Executive Proclamation: Michigan Week is a "time to encourage greater knowledge and awareness of Michigan and its history; to afford an inspired view of our state's advantages to the world; and to foster a spirit of cooperation among all communities that will make the Great Lake State even more livable and attractive."

Secretary Miller is Michigan's Chief Motor Vehicle Administrator and Chief Historian. "We are the undisputed fresh water recreational Mecca of the world," Secretary Miller said. "Add to that all the other recreational opportunities and the unique combination of our rural roots and Motown sophistication—you have an unbeatable combination. Michigan Week allows us to celebrate

our heritage together."

Dr. Vandament is a Michigan booster who is committed to sharing his own deep appreciation for the Upper Peninsula's diversity and special contributions. "We need to tell the positive story of our state and our people loudly and often. Michigan Week offers the perfect opportunity."

Michigan Week is believed to be the only event of its kind in the nation because it brings together the public and private sectors in celebration of our state's people, diversity and accomplishments, Secretary Miller said.

According to Governor John Engler's proclamation for this 44th annual Michigan Week, May 17-26, 1997: "Michigan is blessed beyond measure with natural wonders and man-made marvels... We should all be proud of our majestic state and ready to share with others the many reasons why we call it home."

This year's Michigan Week theme is Celebrate the Magic of Michigan: It's No Illusion. Honorary event chair this year is Harry Blackstone, Jr.

Festivities got underway

Wednesday, May 7, when Governor John Engler joined Secretary Miller and Dr. Vandament for the official kickoff at the State Capitol.

At that time the winners of the second annual Governor

John B. Swainson awards for outstanding government service were announced. Alice

Swainson, Governor Swainson's widow, was on hand for the special ceremony, which was carried live via satellite by the Michigan Association of Broadcasters.

On the first official day of the 10-day celebration, Saturday, May 17, parades will be held in Sturgis, Lansing and Holland. On Monday, May 19, nearly 200 mayors around the state will be trading places with their counterparts in the annual Mayor's Exchange.

Other Michigan Week programs include URead Michigan, and the statewide Volunteer Leadership and Community Achievement awards ceremony hosted by the Marshall Rotary Club on Tuesday, May 20.

The Memorial Day holiday weekend concludes the celebration with parades in St. Clair Shores and Sterling Heights.

I am of the opinion there is no control of bus department personnel being exercised by the Superintendent of Manchester Community Schools. Three different indi-

The men's Track & Field team had a solid final week of the regular season. We had a home meet on Tuesday with Hanover Horton, an away meet at Vandercook Lake on Thursday, and the 19th annual Manchester Metric Relays on Saturday. We had some outstanding performances in each of these meets. We are primed and ready for the Regional, Conference, Selby, and State meets.

It came down to 1600 relay for the third time this season versus Hanover-Horton on Tuesday. The team of Aaron Wallace, Jeremy Smith, Nick Weidmayer, and Nick Davis ran their best time of the year in 3:39.8 to pull off the victory. Nick Weidmayer and Aaron Wallace were also heroes in the 800 meter run by going first and second to prevent us from losing the meet and giving the 1600 relay a chance to win it.

Other outstanding performances came from our 400 relay team of Pat DuRussel, Jason Miner, Ryan Fielder, and Derick Hanewald. Hanewald also long jumped very well. Miner and Fielder threw the discus 119' 7" and 116' 10 1/2" respectively to go first and second in that event. Nick Davis added victories in the 100, 200, and 400. Nick Gordon also pole vaulted a personal best and freshman record of 10' 3". We were happy to escape with the 70 - 67 victory.

Thursday night we ran into the best team in the conference in Vandercook Lake. They dominated us in the weight events and the Sprint relays and we never recovered. Nick Davis finished his season undefeated in the 200 and the 400, and also won the 100. The 3200 relay team of Nick Weidmayer, Jason Schaible, Jeremy Smith, and Aaron Wallace ran a school record 8:50. 8 and solidified their place as a Conference contender in that race. Weidmayer and Wallace went first and second in the 800 again, with Jason Schaible running a personal best of 2:10.9 in that event also. Jason Flint had an excellent day in the hurdle events. This was the last meet of the dual meet season. We feel we have been successful this year. We have the first winning record in 20 years at 4 - 3. That is something we are very proud of. The future looks bright.

sorts of special needs. Another issue is how a general education teacher can possibly meet the needs of students with so many special requirements. The qualifications of teachers are changing and will continue to change.

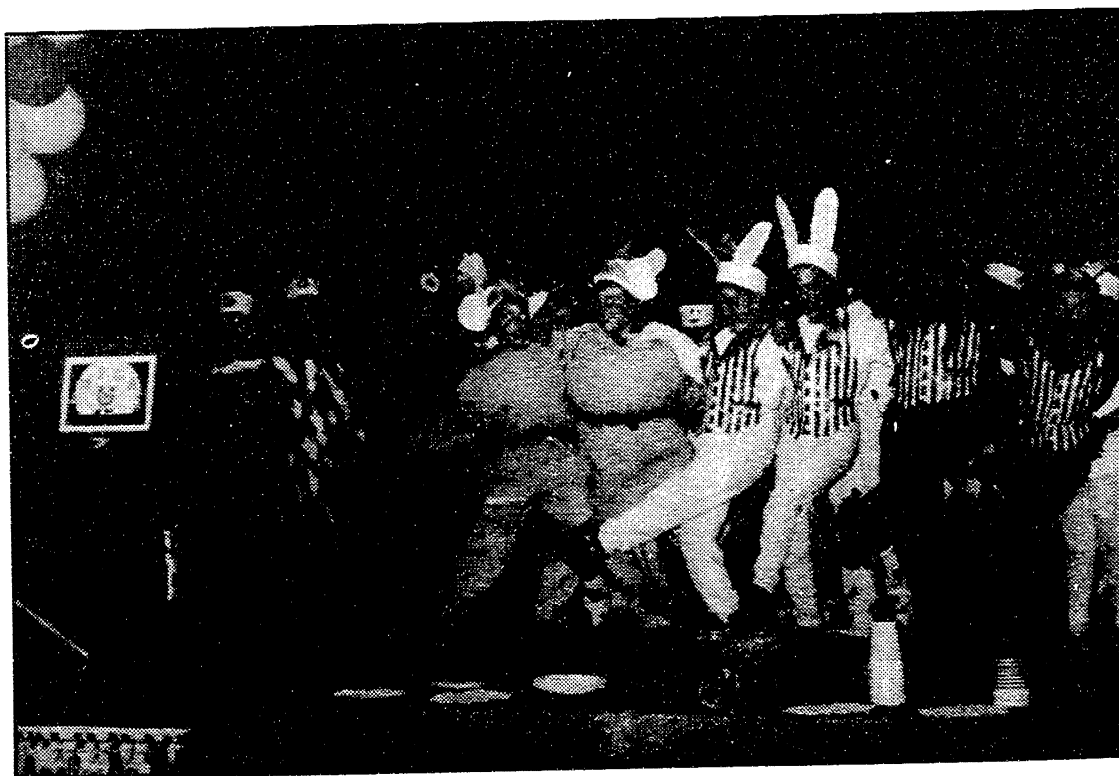

treat for seniors today. 9:30 is departure time and if you's like to go along, call Marion Ahrens at 428-7865.

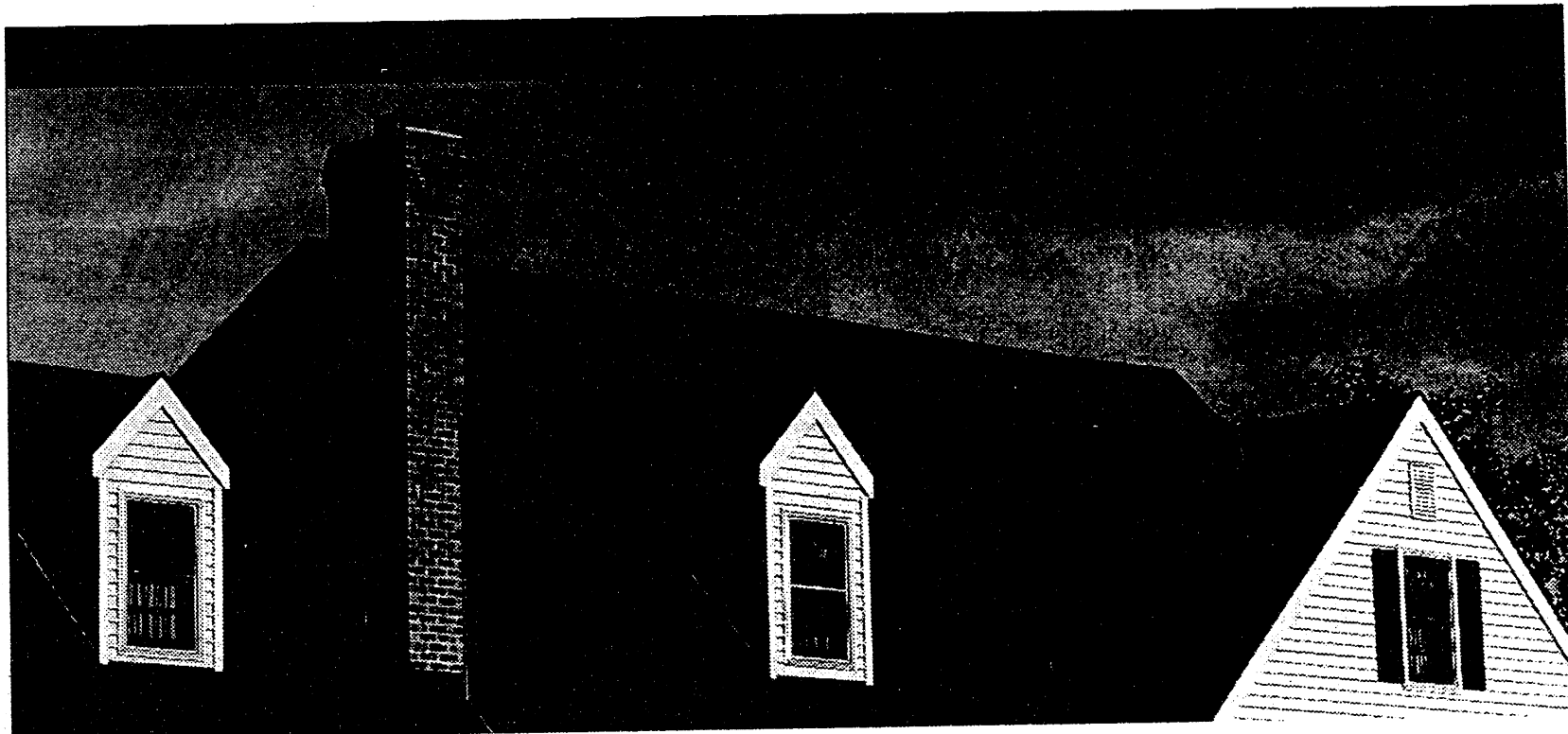

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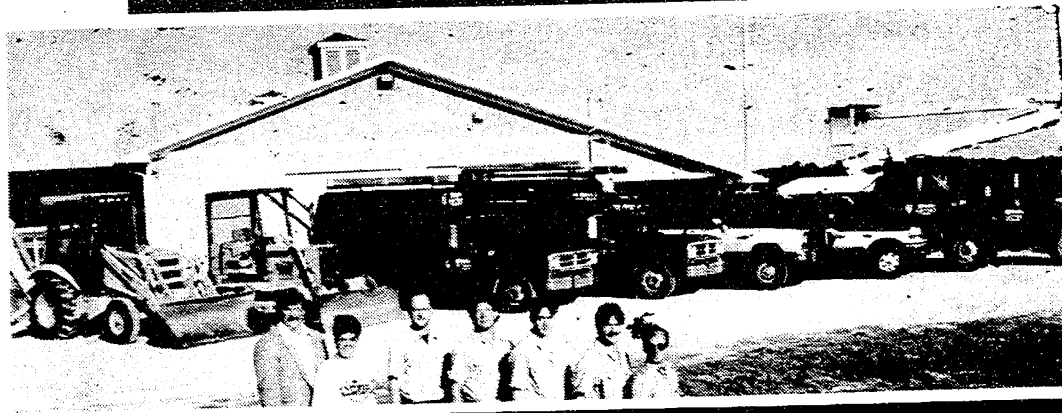
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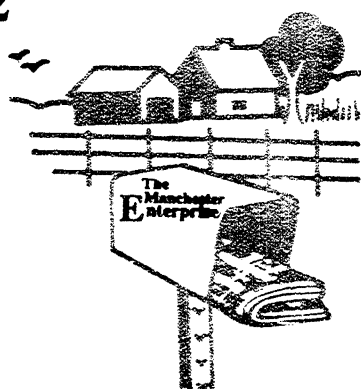
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
