Manchester Chicken Broil

44 Years and Still Counting

In the early summer of 1953, a number of members of the Exchange Club of Manchester got together at Stanton "Pat" Roesch's home at Pleasant Lake. They grilled some chickens and decided it tasted pretty good. How about a fund-raising dinner? It was, in fact, the inaugural Chicken Broil.

The Exchange Club, precursor to today's Optimist Club, was the original sponsoring organization of the Broil. Their purpose, back in 1954, was to erect a fence around the Athletic Field (currently Alumni Field opposite the middle school.)

Although it was another year before the "official" Manchester Annual Chicken Broil was initiated in August of 1954, the men who attended this meeting are among some of the most familiar names in Manchester's recent history.

Combining Dr. Howard Zindel's recipe with Ludy Klager's chickens and a variety of side servings, including coleslaw, chips, radishes and a beverage, was a combination that worked forty-four years ago, and continues to work today. Although the Klager chickens are no longer to be found, the high quality birds in this year's chicken broil will keep you coming back next year, and the year after that...

Forty-four years later, the number of men and boys who work on the Chicken Broil has increased greatly from the group shown here. Our original Broil attracted a few thousand attendees; these days, the tally is usually around 14,000.

Although most of the Exchange Club members pictured at right are no longer with us, their vision of community service, fellowship, and great chicken dinners, still lives on. They would be proud of the Chicken Broil the way it is today.

Also among the planning committee members, but not included in the photograph above were Dr. J.R. Jones, Roscoe Lannom, Earl Mann, Ed Galloway, Walter Vogt, Tom Walton, Carl Schaible, George Merriman, Franklin Reck, and Donald Sutton.

These days the Chicken Broil helps finance such projects as the purchase and renovation of the Blacksmith Shop, new shelves for the Manchester Township Library, park purchases and equipment, athletic equipment and development, and much more. Next year's funds have been pledged to the Fire Department for the new Rescue Truck (\$15,000); to the planned Weight Facility at the High School (\$25,000), and to more acquisitions for Chi-Bro Park (\$7,000). The tradition of

community service continues for the Manchester Annual Chicken Broil. Over the years, a total of over \$200,000 has been donated to various community projects

Many thanks to Ted Tapping and Simon Steele for the historical background, and for identifying many of the members of the Exchange Club. Those with whom I have been acquainted, have changed just slightly since the photo was taken in 1953.


As always, the gazebo concert will go on rain or shine! IN case of inclement weather, the concerts will be held at St. Mary Parish Center.



Is it possible to have oat bugs this early? I have noticed a few very small black moving things the size of thread moving around in the house now that the windows are open. Can you remember the year that they were even in our picture frames? Suppose it's about time for them again.

From our down-home Stryker Advance-Reporter and the many years ago column comes this from June 13, 1907: "1816, the year without a summer. The record of the weather in the northern states for that fateful year follows-March was cold and stormy. Vegetation had gotten along well in April, when real winter set in. Snow and sleet fell on 17 different days in May. In June there was frost or snow every night but three. The snow was five inches deep for several days in succession in the interior of New York and from ten inches to three feet in Vermont and Maine. July was cold and frosty; ice formed as thick as window panes every one of the New England states. August was still worse, ice formed nearly an inch in thickness and killed nearly every green thing in the United States. In the spring of 1817, corn which had been kept over from the crop of 1815, sold for from \$5 to \$10 per bushel, the

buyers purchasing for seed." And we thought spring would never come this year!
