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
# 1996 - Year of Change and Growth

There is pride in a job well done. Manchester can look back on 1996 with pride as we recall the many changes which have come to our community during the past year. Challenges have been overcome. We have seen a myriad of positive changes in our schools, a thriving downtown business district, and the probability of more changes to come in the size and shape of our village. Who knows what 1997 will bring?

The major news of this past year had to be the construction of new additions at the Nellie Ackerson Middle School and at Klager Elementary. At the middle school, the two buildings were connected at last, and this corridor incorporated state of the art technology and computer labs. The result of long years of work by the Technology Committee composed of staff, board and community members, these rooms represent what's really good about education. Our students have a facility in which they can not only learn, but have fun while doing it; the opportunity for hands-on application of skills; and a school of which they feel justifiably proud.

At Klager Elementary, the changes began a year ago with moving the portable classrooms, and the cycle won't be complete until after the winter holiday break is over; but within

eight short months the size of the school has literally doubled. The excitement the last week of school in December was as palpable as it was during the first week, when the students returned to a completely remodeled "old" building. Now that those of us who stop in at Klager regularly have acclimated to the changes there, still more changes are happening. The fire door we got used to seeing has opened to a corridor connecting the addition to the main building, and the transition is a smooth one from both inside and outside the building. Changes in the faces of the schools are apparent as you step inside the administration offices at the High School and at the Middle School. In addition to the renovation of the office area at the Middle School, the face of Tom George, new principal. at the Middle School, is usually in evidence there. Strolling the hallways inside and the playground outside the building, Mr. George has made his presence felt. Notable among his first few months' accomplishments is the development of a parent group to improve communications between home and school.

An enlarged and improved media center will broaden our students' horizons in the future.

And at the High School we recognize the face of Bob Smith, whose energy and enthusiasm has begun a revitalization of the facility. Mr. Smith's willingness to try just about everything, from being a slave during homecoming week to taking the challenge of the 24 Hour Relay, has added a new dimension to the school. Mr. Smith's New Years Resolution, by the way, is to write and submit articles for the Enterprise in 1997. And the face of the High School, too, will change this year; as the portable classrooms will be moved in the spring to provide extra space for the ever-growing population at the High School.

Speaking of the High School, it entered the new century four years early as the class of 2000 made their appearance there in the fall of 1996. A few varsity jackets are already sporting the "00" numbers. A team composed of members of the class of 2000 participated in a future city competition at Greenfield Village during the winter of 1996, as eighth gradand distinguished themselves as first-time entrants. This class is, indeed,

taking our community into the future.

More ways in which students made a difference this

The MHS varsity cheerleaders made news twice during 1996, receiving first place trophies for both District (February) and Regional (October) competitions. Other athletic teams made history, too: The Cross Country team expanded to the Middle School, and sent several team members to State Finals where they made

a great showing. Wrestling saw three state finalists from Manchester, and an unsurpassed record for wins by Brian Duvall. Girls Basketball not only made it to District competition for the first time in recent memory, but hosted the tournaments. Our Equestrian Team also qualified for state competition and had an excellent year.

The MHS Drama Club performances in March and in November showcased a large number of talented students in roles which varied from disc jockeys and murder suspects to bell-bottomed students (and teachers) of the '70s, as they presented "Tune Into Murder" and "Up the Down Staircase." Director Mrs. June Weiland always seems to bring out the best in these kids' performances. Perhaps the future of the Drama Club will see more support for their productions and more adequate facilities in which to perform.

The Bands experienced change this year, as the popular and talented Ms. Cara Weissman departed and Mr. Jared Throneberry entered as the new director of the Middle School and High School band programs. The proof of this being a positive change, however, is in the excellent performances given by the bands at all levels during their Marching Band

# D.A.R.E. Benefit Hockey Game

D.A.R.E. is a program which benefits students throughout our school system and throughout the county, through the Washtenaw County Sheriff Department.D.A.R.E. stands for "Drug Abuse Resistance Education" and has been part of Manchester Community Schools' curriculum since 1991.

For the first few years, the D.A.R.E. classes were limited to fourth graders. But after the first Annual 24 Hour Relay Challenge in 1995, the program was expanded to reach the High School, and last year the Middle School students also benefited from a second exposure to the D.A.R.E. message, which will repeat once more when they reach ninth grade.

Deputy Angie Catalano of the D.A.R.E unit, who teaches the classes here in Manchester, indicates that the entire school district has demonstrated their support for the program. "We have a visitation program in grades K-4, the fourth grade D.A.R.E. class, and programs for seventh and ninth graders in our district."

The fourth grade program is one hour per week for 17 weeks, and has been ongoing since the beginning of the year. It will soon be time for the D.A.R.E. graduation for our fourth graders. In the 7th grade, the tenhour program is extended over ten weeks; and in 9th grade, Deputy Catalano does ten consecutive days during the health classes.

Catalano stresses that D.A.R.E. not only reinforces the prevention message, but teaches the kids life skills. "We educate the kids about the pitfalls of being involved with drugs and violence; but we also want to educate them to make good decisions," she maintains.

"We teach conflict resolution skills; we talk about decision making and evaluating the programs. This will cover the consequences of your decisions. We also discuss how to deal with stress and anger. Peer pressure can be hard, but we teach our D.A.R.E. students that your friends won't have to face the consequences of your actions. YOU will," continues Catalano.

Speaking about the benefits of D.A.R.E., Catalano said she feels it is effective for a couple of reasons. "First, it helps the students to realize that there are consequences of your actions. attend the First Annual A second benefit is that there are a lot of kids living this right now. We're answering important questions for them; being a sounding board for their concerns." She explains that, especially over the term of a 17week class, that a bond is built between officers and the stu-

dents; which "bridges the gap between the uniform and the real person. Some of the kids are surprised to know I have children, too. They find out we're real people that they can trust."

Supporting our D.A.R.E. program, as well as other D.A.R.E. programs throughout the county, is the purpose behind the first annual D.A.R.E. Benefit Hockey Game to be held on Saturday, January 11 at 5 PM. The Ann Arbor Ice Cube has donated ice time for this event, and promise of great hockey action, quality family time spent together, as well as the many raffle prizes which have been donated by businesses throughout the county, are sure to attract hockey fans and D.A.R.E fans alike! The hockey stars of WCSD D.A.R.E. will challenge the Chelsea D.A.R.E. officers to an exciting game which will provide entertainment for the whole family.

Your \$5 entry ticket is also a raffle ticket, and one child under 12 will be admitted free with every paid adult entry. Each child will also receive their own raffle ticket to receive some of the great prizes that will be given away during the game. Among these are a Detroit Red Wings jacket, signed by Red Wings alumni and actor Jeff Daniels. The Public consensus was generally guided by the way the majority of the residents answered the survey questions.

Commission

Mary Spaller was present to request an extension on the temporary dwelling permit for her property located at 10671 Burmeister Road. The request was approved.

Area survey assignments were made for each Planning Commission member. Members were requested to survey their territory periodically--perhaps every three months—to note changing conditions and potential zoning violations.

Planning Consultant, James Schafer from Birchler Arroyo, Inc. noted that strictness of Zoning Ordinance enforcement depends on policy set by the township. Some townships respond only to complaints, while others are constantly surveying the area seeking out violations. He stated that it is important to remember that zoning is regulation of land use so that negative usage is not created.

Commission Chairman, James Fish stated that good government requires an even-handed enforcement policy. He noted that the Commission's policy of periodically surveying the township is not an endorsement of extremely strict enforcement. The survey will provide planning information and identify developing situations that could become large problems if action is not taken. Other commission members voiced agreement with this approach.

The Planning Commission directed the Planning Consultant to produce the final draft of the updated Zoning Ordinance. The draft should be available by late January.

The next regular meeting is January 13, 1997 at 7:30 PM. Wade Peacock

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





# Sauk Trail Nominated as a Heritage Route

On Wednesday, December 18, the Bridgewater Township Board unanimously nominated U.S. 12 as a Michigan Historic Heritage Route. U.S. 12 is also known as the Sauk Trail.

The Sauk Trail was established in pre-history, first as an animal trail and then as a path for the native Americans. It became an important thread through the wilderness, holding the early communities together as well as military roads which became highways for the early settlers. After paving in 1925, it was an open road for the newly invented automobile, recreational trips into the country and a direct route to Chicago.

The Michigan Heritage Routes Program promotes a greater awareness of and appreciation for Michigan's scenic, historic and recreational resources. If selected by the Michigan Department of Transportation, the road would take on a unified image via state maps, promotional materials and road signs.

The grass roots effort to name U.S. 12 as a Michigan Heritage Route is led by Gladys Saborio of Saline and Joanne Rasmussen, a Bridgewater Township resident. Volunteers from Detroit to the Indiana border are involved in the nomination process.

'Freedom from Smoking" is a seven-session structured clinic offering a step-by-step approach to stop smoking. The group will meet on Mondays at the hospital.



# Final Preparations at Klager School



spent on this new facility, the students are in no way at a loss for options.


From the outside, the new gym is the major attraction. Although it isn't complete yet, the size is a big improvement over the old gym.

# 20 WAYS TO BOOST YOUR SAVINGS: 1997 AND BEYOND

It's wise to save at least 10 percent of your pre-tax income so you can adequately provide for your retirement and meet other financial goals. Sound impossible? It may be easier than you think. To get you started, the Michigan Association of CPAs provides these 20 ways to boost your savings and the return on your savings in 1997 and in years to come.

- 1) Pare down your debt. Unless you can find an investment with an after-tax return that's higher than what you're paying on your debt (and that's not likely), reducing your debt is the first step toward smart saving.
- 2) Track your spending. If you don't have a clue about where your money goes, try monitoring your spending for a few months. Then look for ways to cut back spending and increase your savings.
- 3) Pay yourself first. As long as your debts are under control, put a pre-determined amount away in a savings plan each month before you make big-ticket purchases.
- 4) Make it automatic. Authorize your bank to transfer a set amount each month from your checking account to a savings account, mutual fund or another investment vehicle.
- 5) Maximize your 401(k) contribution. Remember every dollar you invest in this qualified retirement plan reduces your gross income by the same amount.
- 6) Save the small stuff. Rather than cashing small checks

you receive for dividend payments, insurance reimbursement, birthday gifts, and the like, deposit them in your savings account.

- 7) Bank "extra" checks. If you get paid biweekly, two months out of the year you'll get three instead of the usual two paychecks. Save those two checks and you'll boost your savings significantly.
- 8) Revise your W-4 form. If you got a large tax refund last year, reduce your withholding for 1997. You'll get a bigger paycheck and you can save or invest the extra cash so that you - and not Uncle Sam — earn interest on your
- 9) Save your raise. Resolve to save the extra money you get in your paycheck after you've gotten a raise. Do the same with any bonuses you receive and you'll really come out ahead.
- 10) Make it painless. If your adjustable rate mortgage adjusts downward, plan to save - not spend — your monthly windfall.
- 11) Reach for higher yields. To compete with money market mutual funds, some banks offer penalty-free Certificates of Deposit (CDs)— but watch out for hidden charges.
- 12) Put found money away. If you're earning more than the Social Security withholding cap on payroll taxes, your Social Secu-

rity deduction will stop before yearend. Take the portion of your salary that you previously turned over to the government and put it toward your personal retirement savings.

- 13) Switch credit cards. With a credit card that charges less interest, you can pay off your balance faster and free up money for sav-
- 14) Open a "think twice" account. Every time you decide not to buy something, write a check for the amount you would have paid for the item and deposit it into a separate account. Before long, you'll forget what you gave up and have a tidy sum to invest.
- 15) Pay down your mortgage. Send an extra \$50 or more with your monthly mortgage payment and you'll pay off your mortgage earlier and save thousands on
- 16) Make the most of emergency funds. Don't keep all your emergency funds—typically three to six months worth of living ex-

penses — in a low-yielding savings account. Put a portion of it in higher-yielding, yet liquid investments, such as short-term CDs or money market mutual funds.


- 17) Use a discount broker or buy direct. Unless you need professional advice, consider buying and selling stocks and bonds through a discount broker. You can also cut your costs by buying stock directly from a company.
- 18) Consider investing in municipal bonds. Any interest earned on these bonds is free of federal income tax. That feature


can boost the yield on your investment significantly.

- 19) Refinance your mortgage. Consider looking into refinancing if the interest rate on your existing mortgage is two or more points higher than today's rates. Then invest the money you save on your monthly payment.
- 20) Commit to planning. Keep more of your money when you take advantage of opportunities available to those who make tax planning a year-round event.



REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE. THE OWNER OR OCCUPANT OF ANY PREMISES, OR THE OWNER OF ANY UNOCCUPIED PREMISES OR REAL PROPERTY, IS REQUIRED TO KEEP THE CONSTRUCTED SIDEWALKS IN FRONT OF, OR ADJACENT TO SUCH PREMISES CLEARED FROM SNOW AND ICE WHICH WILL IMPEDE PASSAGE ON SUCH SIDEWALKS.


(1) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (3) HEREOF, SNOW AND ICE SHALL BE SO REMOVED FROM SIDEWALKS IN ALL BUSINESS DISTRICTS BY FOUR (4) BUSINESS HOURS AFTER THE CESSATION OF ANY FALL OF SNOW, SLEET, OR FREEZING RAIN, OR BY THE BEGINNING OF BUSINESS HOURS OF THE NEXT DAY FOLLOWING SUCH FALL, WHICHEVER PERIOD IS SHORTER.

(2) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTIONS (3) OR (4) HEREOF, SNOW AND ICE SHALL BE SO REMOVED FROM ALL RESIDENTIAL SIDEWALKS WITHIN TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOURS AFTER THE CESSATION OF ANY FALL OF SNOW, SLEET, OR FREEZING RAIN.

(3) INTHE EVENT SNOW AND ICE ON A SIDEWALK HAS BECOME SO HARD THAT IT CANNOT BE REMOVED WITHOUT THE LIKELIHOOD OF DAMAGE TO THE SIDEWALK, THE PERSON RESPONSIBLE FOR ITS REMOVAL SHALL, WITHIN THE TIME REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTIONS (1) OR (2), HAVE ENOUGH SAND OR OTHER ABRASIVE PUT ON THE SIDEWALK TO MAKE TRAVEL THEREON REASONABLY SAFE. SNOW AND ICE SHALL THEN BE REMOVED AS SOON AS IT CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED WITHOUT THE LIKELIHOOD OF DAMAGE TO THE SIDEWALK.

(4) EXEMPTIONS. IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS ONLY, PERSONS WHO, FOR REASONS OF INFIRMITY, BELIEVE COMPLIANCE WITH SUBSECTIONS (2) AND (3) WOULD CAUSE UNDUE HARDSHIP, MAY FILE A REQUEST FOR EXEMPTION WITH THE VILLAGE CLERK. THE CLERK SHALL APPROVE OR DISAPPROVE THE REQUEST ACCORDING TO GUIDELINES ADOPTED BY COUNCIL. IF APPROVED THE VILLAGE MAY THEN REMOVE SNOW AND ICE FROM THESE SIDEWALKS AT A COST TO BE ESTABLISHED BY COUNCIL RESOLUTION, BASED ON LENGTH, IN FEET, OF SIDEWALK.

(5) FAILURE TO COMPLY. IF THE PERSON RESPONSIBLE FOR THE REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE FAILS TO COMPLY WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THIS SECTION, THEN THE VILLAGE MAY REMOVE THE SNOW AND ICE, AND THE COST THEREOF MAY BE COLLECTED AS A SINGLE LOT ASSESSMENT UNDER CHAPTER 3, SECTION 1.85 OF THIS CODE. FURTHER, SUCH RESPONSIBLE PARTY SHALL BE LIABLE TO THE VILLAGE FOR ALL LOSSES TO THE VILLAGE OR RECOVERIES FROM THE VILLAGE FOR DAMAGES TO PERSON OR PROPERTY OF OTHERS CAUSED BY THE FAILURE OF SUCH RESPONSIBLE PARTY TO SO REMOVE ALL SNOW AND ICE ACCUMULATIONS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION.

The annual traffic safety public awareness campaign is designed to combat drinking and driving during the holidays and runs through January 1,1997.


