ILLEGAL ALIENS ARRESTED IN MANCHESTER

Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) Detroit District Director. Carol Jenifer, announced Thursday that INS agents and agents of the Office of the Inspector General, Social Security Administration, arrested sixty one (61) illegal workers in Worksite Enforcement Operations conducted in Manchester at Pilot Metal Products on April 9, 1997. The plant, which has a work force of about 450, will continue their operations with fewer people, using overtime, while trying to hire more employees, according to Larry Gerhard, plant manager.

At approximately 3 PM on Wednesday, the INS positioned vans and agents surrounding the facility. Local sheriff's deputies were called in to assist. The sixty one illegal aliens were handcuffed and escorted from the building, to secured INS vans.

Of the 61 unauthorized workers arrested, 16 were

placed in removal proceedings. Forty-five unauthorized workers requested voluntary return to their country of citizenship. They remained in the custody of the Immigration Service and were removed from the United States within 72 hours. Illegal workers from Mexico and Guatemala were encountered during the operation.

INS did provide roundthe-clock protection to Pilot Metal Products through Sunday. Sgt. Haensler noted that Pilot's management team cooperated through the entire proceedings.

Through the significant cooperation of a major components supplier to the automotive industry, over one hundred possible unauthorized workers were identified during a review of the Employment Eligibility Verification Forms (Form I-9). All of the arrested workers were using either fraudulent alien registration cards and/or fraudulent social security numbers to obtain employment.

"INS is committed to enforcing the immigration laws in the workplace and insuring that illegal workers do not take jobs from those who are authorized to work. Worksite enforcement is part of our strategy to reduce the job magnet for those who want to come to the US illegally. We want both employers and illegal workers to get the message that the INS is serious about worksite enforcement." said Jenifer.

The Immigration Reform and Control Act (IRCA) allows INS to fine employers who do not carry out their responsibilities to look at docu-

ments and to verify that employees are eligible to work. Fines to the employer can range from \$250 to \$2000 per worker for knowingly hiring an illegal worker and from \$100 to \$1000 per worker for not properly completing the Employment Eligibility Verification Form (Form I-9).

"The INS is committed to insuring that legal workers do not have to compete for jobs with those who have no legal right to them" said Jenifer. "We will continue to investigate, arrest and remove those who violate our laws by working here illegally, and we will pursue employers who knowingly hire illegal workers."

Gerhard, who has only been manager at Pilot's Manchester facility for five weeks, was unavailable to comment to the Enterprise at press time. However, Tom Alberts, the spokesperson for Pilot Industries, when asked if Pilot had been fined, stated, "No, ma'am." Do they anticipate being fined for infractions of the IRCA? "We have been informed we will not be fined, based on Pilot's cooperation with INS. Pilot has always complied with all legal requirements."

Paul Schulte takes all the awards in his last Junior Wheelchair Basketball National Tournament

The 1996/1997 wheel-chair basketball season ended this past weekend in Charlotte, North Carolina with the top sixteen teams in the Junior National Championship tournament, the sweet sixteen of the NJWBA (National Junior Wheelchair Basketball Association).

It was Paul Schulte's last set of games as a High School age participant. Although Paul had already accepted a full ride scholarship to play for the University of Texas at Arlington in the Fall, it was his goal to end his Junior career impressively. He wanted to play better than he ever had. And so he did!

The first game was against ZIA of New Mexico. They were ranked 11th in the 16 team group with Paul's Junior Pacers being ranked 6th overall. The Pacer defense proved too much for the ZIA players right from the get-go. Final score Pacers 50, ZIA 24.

The second game brought

lots of attention from the fans and other teams. The Pacers were playing the 3rd ranked Nebraska Red Dawgs. Nebraska had beaten their first opponent 60 to 23 and were looking to handle the Pacers with not much more effort. It was a great time for Paul to catch fire. He drove to the net with finger roll lay-ups while the burned defenders unsuccessfully tried to double team his advance.

In the last seconds of the first half Nebraska triple teamed Paul to make sure he didn't get a clear shot at the net, so Paul pulled back four feet from the three point arc and launched a perfect "nothing but net" three point basket to end the half. In all, Paul scored 38 points in this 67 to 52 win but the stage had been set. With this win it was clear that the Pacers would be the team to beat.

The third game in the series was against the California Ranchos. Paul went cold

from the field but passed the ball well enough to help the Pacer center, Tim Dinkins, get a carrier high 24 points in the 62 to 47 victory.

The only other team to still be undefeated in the tournament was the Chicago CAWS Rebels with their out-

standing point guard, David Radbel. The Rebels were seeded second, behind the Wisconsin Horizons, but had just beaten the Horizons in the semi finals.

The fact was that the Rebels had gone all season without a defeat and were

anxious to beat the Pacers for a start to finish National Championship Season. The Pacers played two types of defense - a full court press and a two-three press where the Pacer Coach Lee Montgomery hoped to use Paul's and the other Pacer guard. Brian Prichard's speed to create havoc for the Rebel's offense. Coach Montgomery was correct in his strategy: between turnovers and foul trouble the CAWS faltered. Paul and the Pacers were National Champions.

Paul was further honored by being chosen as part of the All Tournament Team, and finally, to the surprise of none and to the delight of all, Paul was named Most Valuable Player for the 1997 National Junior Wheelchair Basketball Tournament. From a pool of the 16 top teams, with an average of 12 players per team, this is a great achievement but no surprise to any of his dedicated Manchester fans.

Paul has also been invited to play in the first ever International Juniors Cup Tournament in August. This will be held in Toronto, and include teams from all over the world.



Shakespeare Reading Club

Rowing was first mentioned in 25 A.D. Both participants and judges were required to speak oaths of fair play to the Greek god, Zeus.

The games were abolished by the Christian Roman Emperor Theodosius in 394 A.D. When they were judged to be corrupted by pressures to win at any and all costs. They were later re-established with stricter rules against athletes participating for profit.

In our own time the Russians were found to be subsidizing their athletes and in 1978 the U.S. boycotted the summer games held in Moscow. The U.S.S.R. retaliated four years later when the games were held in Los An-



Manchester Middle School Students of the Day




