




So, Manchester High School's most recent graduating class are on their way to bigger things - jobs, college, and the armed services. Congratulations, Seniors, in whatever you decide to do.


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

# LAST-MINUTE STRATEGIES FOR PAYING COLLEGE COSTS

Ready or not, here come those tuition bills. In the next few months, millions of parents of college-bound students will be making the inevitable switch from saving for college to paying for college. If your child didn't qualify for need-based financial aid, or if what he or she received wasn't enough, the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants (MACPA) suggests you consider the following lastminute strategies for paying college

#### GO FOR FREE FIRST

If you haven't already done so, now is the time to review all possible sources of grants and scholarships. By now, most of the athletic and academic scholarships have been spoken for, so you'll need to be more creative. Check with your employer. Many companies have scholarship programs open to children of their employees. There are also many private scholarships available that are not based on need but, rather, on personal, occupational and education background, as well as organizational affiliation, talent, ethnic origin and other factors. You can find a number of catalogs and directories that provide comprehensive lists of potential grant and scholarship sources.

Or, you can do your search

electronically by checking out the enormous amount of scholarship information available on the Internet. However, if you still find yourself coming up short, borrowing may be your only option.

#### TURN TO THE FED-**ERAL GOVERNMENT**

The government offers several non-need-based loan programs at rates that are generally lower than you would get elsewhere. The government lends to students under the Stafford Loan program, and parents can borrow through the Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students (PLUS) program. Any student who is enrolled in an eligible program of study at least halfqualifies for unsubsidized Stafford Loa-Freshman students can borrow up to \$2,625, sophomores can get up to \$3,500 and \$5,500 is available for each of the two remaining undergraduate years. The Stafford Loan's variable rate, adjusted each year on July 1, is capped at 8.25 percent. However, the student must pay an origination fee of four percent of the amount borrowed, which is deducted from the loan

Interest on unsubsidized Stafford Loans begins to accrue following the first disbursement. Students pay the interest while

they are in school or can choose to defer interest payments until six months after graduation, at which time the accrued interest due is added to the loan balance. Students have up to 10 years to repay Stafford Loans. Depending on the college, the student may arrange for a Stafford Loan either through a bank or through the college's financial aid office.

Parents with good credit histories also can apply for a PLUS loan to pay the education expenses of a child who is enrolled at least halftime. Under the PLUS program, parents may borrow the total cost of the child's tuition, less any other financial aid the child receives.

For example, if your child's cost of attendance is \$10,000, and he or she receives \$2,000 in other financial aid, you may be able to borrow up to \$8,000. Like the Stafford Loan, the interest rate is variable and is adjusted each year on July 1. However, at nine percent, the cap on PLUS Loans is slightly higher than that of Stafford loans. Also, since PLUS Loans do not have a grace period, parents must begin repayment of both principal and interest while their child is still in school. The repayment period is usually 10 years.

#### LOOK CLOSE TO **HOME**

Some families may not re-

alize that they have resources of their own from which they can borrow. For example, by applying for a home equity loan or line of credit, you may be able to use the equity you have built up in your home to pay for tuition. In most cases, interest on up to \$100,000 of a home equity loan is fully deductible. However, borrowing against the equity in your home puts your home at risk if you default on the payments.

Your 401(k) retirement plan provides another source of funds, although it should be used only as a last resort. Most plans allow you to borrow half of your vested balance, up to a maximum loan of \$50,000. The loan

must be paid back within five years. If you quit or lose your job with the loan outstanding, the debt is considered a distribution from the plan. That means the money is treated as taxable income to you and, if you're under age 55, is subject to a 10 percent penalty.

Finally, you also may want to encourage grandparents or other relatives who were planning to make large gifts to your children to do so sooner rather than later to help pay the cost of college. By making such gifts, they'll also be able to reduce their taxable estate.

#### Summary of Bridgewater Township Ordinance Number 25

The Bridgewater Township Board of Trustees adopted ordinance number 25 at its meeting on May 21, 1997. The ordinance is a consolidation of Township ordinances number 20 and number 24. The ordinance regulates the extraction and removal of minerals from property in the Township. It establishes standards and procedures for licensing mineral extraction businesses and it creates a citizen board for reviewing license applications. The exemption provision in the prior ordinances were changed by adding exemptions for site development preparation, public right of way excavation and for ponds.


Feed the adrenal with pantothenic acid and licorice root in your quest tur better health. Sinus congestions seem to respond very well to a number of herbal

Maybe we again need to consider them as our NATU-RAL ALTERNATIVE.



# **County Board of Public Works Awards Grants for "Green" Ideas**

The Washtenaw County Board of Public Works is pleased to announce that selections have been made for the 1997-98 "Green Backs for Green Acts"Innovative Grants Program. The grant program is intended to place funds into the hands of local businesses, non-profits, governments and individuals throughout the county who have demonstrated a good idea for waste reduction. Proposals were sought to address waste reduction, technology development, ,market development, or education/awareness.

After careful evaluation, the Board of Public Works has selected three projects to receive funding through this year's program, as follows:

• The City of Ann Arbor and the University of Michi-Food Waste and Composting Pilot, \$19,065

- Great Lakes Radio Consortium: Waste Reduction Commentaries and features on Public Radio, \$20,000 grant
- Western Washtenaw **Recycling Authority:** Waste Oil Recycling Project, \$15,800 grant.

The City of Ann Arbor Solid Waste Department and the U of M Department of Grounds and Waste Management will work jointly to initiate a food waste composting pilot program. Organic materials, including food waste, represent a significant portion of our overall solid waste stream. Currently, there are no large scale food waste composting programs in the state of Michigan, and material from University

kitchens is disposed of in area landfills. This project will test the feasibility of adding food waste collected from dormitory kitchens to large scale yard waste composting facilities. If proven to be successful, this project could serve as a model for similar endeavors in the future.


Using the air waves as an educational tool, the Great Lakes Radio Consortium will develop and broadcast monthly commentaries and bimonthly features concerning waste reduction. These informative sessions will stress the importance of source reduction, dealing with waste on the front end, rather than the back end approach of dealing with waste after its been generated.

The Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority



# MANCHESTER TRACK & FIELD REGIONALS AND CONFERENCE

The season is winding down for the boys' track & field program at Manchester high school. Traditionally, the last four meets of the season are the regional, conference, Selby, and state, in that order. We've made it through the first two, and the performances were brilliant. The flying Dutchmen topped off their first winning season in twenty years with exceptional performances at the regional and conference track & field meets.

The boys ran their way to a fifth place finish out of nineteen teams at regional #28C in Union City on Friday, may 16th. Leading the way once again was junior sensation Nick Davis. Nick won the tough triple of the 100. 200, and 400 meter dashes. He also anchored our fourth place finishing 1600 relay team. His winning times for the dashes were 11.1, 22.9, and a new school record 49.6, respectively. He qualified for the state meet in all of those events. Other outstanding performances came from senior Landon Burkhardt in the discus (122'7"), Ben Grenier in the high jump 5'6"), Jason Miner in the discus (119'9"), and Kyle Harris in the 3200 (11:23.6). One of our goals for the season is to perform our best times, throws, jumps, and vaults at the regional and conference meets. A large number of our athletes arose to that challenge on Friday night and set personal bests. Freshmen Jason Flint in the 110 hurdles (18.1), Derick Hanewald in the long jump (19'), Nick Gordon in the pole vault (10'6"), Pat DuRussel, II in the high jump (5' 9"), Aaron Wallace in the 800 (2:07.7 - freshmen record), and Kevin Sahakian in the 3200 (11:31.5). Sophomore Kreg Norgaard ran over a second faster than before in the 300 intermediate hurdles (44.7). Junior Jeremy Smith ran 10 seconds faster in the 1600 run (4:53.8) than his

previous best. Seniors Nick Weidmayer and Brad Kemner ran their lifetime bests in the 800 run (2:04.8 - fifth place and fifth place in school history), and in the 1600 run (5:12.2), respectively. Finally, the 3200 relay team consisting of Nick Weidmayer, Jason Schaible, Jeremy Smith, and Aaron Wallace lowered their school record to 8:35.8 to finish fifth.

It was a great meet for the young Dutchmen. The performances were outstanding, and these men stepped up to the challenge of a big meet in a big way. Great job, Gentlemen!

The conference meet was held at Michigan center high school on Tuesday, may 20th. Once again, the Flying Dutchmen came prepared to perform and finished fourth. This fourth place finish combined with their fourth place finish in the dual meet season entrenched the boys team firmly in, you guessed it, fourth place overall in the league.





life to date.


