## David Sweeton Earns Eagle Scout Rank



### Earning the Rank of Eagle

The rank of Eagle is Scouting's highest; only 1-2% advance to this level. The Eagle Scout must prove leadership skills both in his troop and community, successfully complete a service project, and earn 21 merit badges. The Eagle must also have good attendance, a complete understanding of scouting fundamentals, and embody the ideals and virtues set forth in the Scout Law.

### David Mathew Sweeton

David joined Troop 426 in April 1991. In little more than two years, he earned the rank of Life Scout, one step below Eagle.

The 12 required badges which David earned include Camping, Citizenship in the Community, Citizenship in the Nation, Citizenship in the World, Communications, Emergency Preparedness, Environmental Science, First Aid, Personal Management, Safety, Swimming, and Family Life. He also earned 17 elective badges in Atomic Energy, Canoeing, Chemistry, Computers, Energy, Fishing, Fish & Wildlife Mgmt, Geology, Mammal Study, Nature, Orienteering, Pioneering, Rifle Shooting, Soil & Water Conservation, Space Exploration, Weather, and Wilderness Survival. The total number exceeds the requirement for earning the Bronze Palm.

His appointments include, Jr. Assistant Scoutmaster, Senior Patrol Leader and Assistant Senior Patrol Leader. He also served as Troop Librarian.

David has also earned the World Conservation Award, the 100% Attendance Award, and two Quality Unit Awards. He has completed training courses in CPR, JASM, JLT, SPL, and Leadership.

His Eagle Service Project provided a much needed parking area behind the Manchester Township Library. Construction involved surveying, considerable soil preparation, and integration with the barrier free ramp at the rear entrance. David obtained the necessary materials, equipment and manpower from both the public and private sectors.

## Achievement in Education Award

The Manchester Optimist Club annually chooses a recipient for their Achievement in Education award. This award recognizes a very special educator in the Manchester school system, including teachers, counselors, administrators, board members, social workers, and others.

The guidelines for this award include gauging the recipient's commitment and dedication to students, and the positive impact they have made on those students whose lives they have touched. Also considered are previous peer recognition or other awards earned.

This year's award was given to Mrs. Mary Nosbisch. Mrs. Nosbisch has taught at all levels in Manchester Community Schools, from kindergarten through high school, over the past decade. Her dedication to all of her students, at any level of ability, is remarkable. She is currently teaching 8th and 9th grade English classes at both Manchester Middle School and Manchester High School. She also co-directed this spring's highly successful



Drama Club performance at the High School, and will be directing again in the fall. She was instrumental in developing a Junior Optimist Club at the Middle School.

Some of the positive comments received about Mrs. Nosbisch include, "We Optimists can see how very good she is because we see and hear her students' presentations at the Oratorical Contests. She

is able to motivate these kids at an age where it's most often difficult to do."

"She is caring and supportive and motivating and challenging - whatever is needed to reach the individual student. Most of all she cares deeply for the growing young persons whom she teaches."

"She has the respect of students and parents alike. She is especially effective

with Middle School students, and has been helpful in bridging students from Middle School to High School."

Teaching a difficult, but required, subject (English) to middle school and high school students can be a formidable challenge - but time and again, Mrs. Nosbisch has been shown equal to the challenge. As a dedicated, caring professional to students of all ages and abilities she is able to make this subject interesting as well as make each student successful regardless of their abilities. This is the mark of a truly outstanding teacher.

Mrs. Nosbisch readily admits that she holds high expectations for her students. Most of the time, she gets exactly what she expects - and frequently more. She has a keen sense of each individual student's abilities and spurs them on to achievements they may have never expected.

In her years of teaching kindergarten, fourth, fifth, eighth and ninth graders, Mrs. Nosbisch has touched the lives of hundreds of Manchester students. The class of 2000 is particularly fortunate that they have experienced her teaching at several different levels. Each student who has been in her

class, is a better student for having had her as a teacher. She has truly made a difference in the education of Manchester's young people.

In the words of one recommendation "She goes the extra miles beyond being a good teacher to being an excellent teacher. She should be recognized for her outstanding abilities."

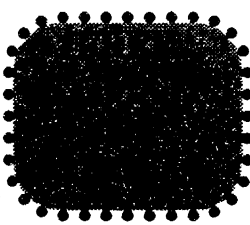

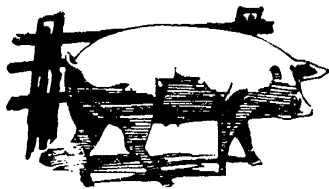

## Out of the Pen

It's time for the 1997 24 Hour Relay Challenge. This year, her involvement has been more of a "challenge" than in previous years - but that's just part of the bargain. In fact, she's getting to the point where she's looking forward to this.

In past years the Relay has been a time when garlene forged new relationships with her friends, her family, and others with whom she has shared a rainy, cold, and tiring experience. This year promises to be no exception.

If you're not sure what the 24 Hour Relay is, read on.

In the fall of 1994, a man named Rick Phillips came to Manchester, at the invitation of Deputy Jon Scicluna, who was Klager's D.A.R.E. instructor. Deputy Scicluna and Mrs. Yvonne Henry were looking for ways to fund future D.A.R.E. programs at Klager and expand it to other levels.

Rick got a lot of people (and at least one pig) excited about the idea of a 24 Hour Relay over a two day seminar. Manchester's first Relay was held on Memorial Day week-

end, 1995. The first Relay attracted twelve teams. Last year, 13 teams participated. This year, we have sixteen teams signed up; including a team dubbed "The Starship Enterprise."

So, what do these teams do? Each team has ten members. One member of each team is on the track at any given time. When that team member has run (or walked, or crawled) one mile, they hand off a baton to the next team member. This goes on for - you guessed it - 24 hours. Around the clock, teams keep circling the track. Those who aren't running or walking are on the sidelines encouraging

their teammates - and others, too.

Some teams enjoy seeing how many miles they can accomplish in the given 24 hours. Last year, Runners High passed the 200-mile mark. Others, like the Tuff Knights, make a point of doing the fewest possible miles - including a memorable 4-hour mile by Donald DuRussel. The rest of us land somewhere in the middle of these two extremes. But no matter how many miles your team achieves, you gain something more important...a sense of fulfillment, a new understanding of yourself and your teammates, and more than likely, a few sore muscles.

After participating in a Relay, you're never quite the same. After participating in three Relays, will garlene be certifiable? Time will tell. Come back next week for the answer.

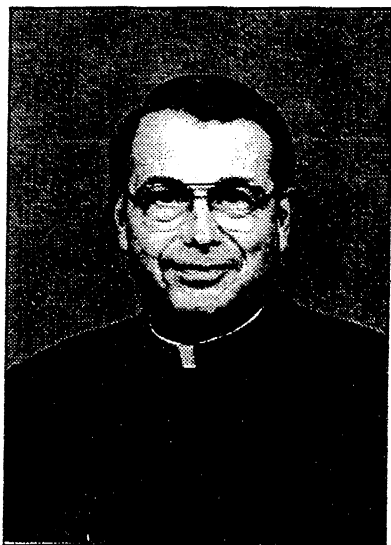

Monday, June 16, 1997; Some 83 years have passed since Manchester witnessed the passing of some of the vehicles which were seen on our streets this day. Cars from as far away as Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana rolled down our now-paved roadways. These vehicles will be touring local villages and cities within a one day's journey of Tecumseh.

The Veteran Motor Car Club of America, Local Tecumseh Chapter is headed by Mr. Clem Campbell. Over 40 old one- and two- cylinder automobiles were on this touring display. To be a part of this group, your vehicle must be titled as a 1914 or older model. Some of the manufacturers represented were Brush, Buick, Cadillac, Darrarq, Mason, Maxwell, Renault, REO, Oldsmobile. The oldest vehicle was a 1901 Curved dash Oldsmobile. The Darrarq, not a commonly known vehicle, was a 1909 model.

The 1904 Curved Dash Oldsmobile, owned by Sue Neller of Williamston, will be featured in a movie recreation of the 1905 Transcontinental Race, to be released in August this year. This race started in Hells Gate, New York and went to Portland, Oregon. A grand prize of \$1,000.00, went to the winner. Although this particular vehicle did not participate in the actual race, it was a representative of many of the vehicles included in the race. Only 105 of this model were ever manufactured.

At the time of the race no transcontinental roads existed, and hard surfaced roads between cities were not to be found. One of the purposes of the Transcontinental Race was to determine if it was viable to build roads for transcontinental auto travel.

It seemed fitting to have these old fashioned cars in our old-fashioned village, if only for a day. They will be passing through again Wednesday, enroute to spend a day in Chelsea.
