This Weekend-The 24 **Hour Relay** Challenge


This weekend you can check out 24 hours worth of family oriented entertainment at the Manchester 24 Hour Relay.

Achievement in Education Award

The Manchester Optimist Club annually chooses a recipient for their Achievement in Education award. This award recognizes a very special educator in the Manchester school system, including teachers, counselors, administrators, board members, social workers, and others.

The guidelines for this award include gauging the recipient's commitment and dedication to students, and the positive impact they have made on those students whose lives they have touched. Also considered are previous peer recognition or other awards earned.

This year's award was given to Mrs. Mary Nosbisch. Mrs. Nosbisch has taught at all levels in Manchester Community Schools, from kindergarten through high school, over the past decade. Her dedication to all of her students, at any level of ability, is remarkable. She is currently teaching 8th and 9th grade English classes at both Manchester Middle School and Manchester High School. She also co-directed this spring's highly successful



Drama Club performance at the High School, and will be directing again in the fall. She was instrumental in developing a Junior Optimist Club at the Middle School.

Some of the positive comments received about Mrs. Nosbisch include, "We Optimists can see how very good she is because we see and hear her students' presentations at the Oratorical Contests. She

is able to motivate these kids at an age where it's most often difficult to do."





Haensler and Marcus Kirby-WCSD, Don Limpert, Tim and Valerie Cox, Jim Mann, Clerk Tucker, and Manager Wallace.

The minutes of the May 19, 1997 regular meeting were approved as presented on a motion by Marshall, support by Way. Vote: Ayes-all. Abstain: Mahony, Conaway.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION Jim Mann introduced Tim and Valerie Cox and explained their request to have the tap-in fees waived for the home located at 515 Clarkston St. This property has paid taxes to cover the bond issues over the years and did not benefit directly. Tap-in fees have been waived in the past for various reasons. It was estimated that there are approximately 30 homes that are not hooked into the sewer system that may be affected by this decision. Ames pointed out that the reason fees were raised was to look out for the future when we will have to expand the WWTP. The DPW Committee will meet Thursday, June 5th at 8:00 AM to discuss the best policy. A decision will be made at the June 16th Council meeting.

Discussion was held on increase in traffic at M-52 and Main St. Sgt. Haensler recommended that Council meet with the County Road Commission, the gravel company and the Township to come up with an alternate route out of the Village, since the growth in the community will only make things worse.

Ames asked if Sgt. Haensler had met with her neighbor on their concern yet. As soon as the Commander approves Sgt. Haensler's response it will be mailed.

Sgt. Haensler asked for a meeting of the Sheriff Dept. Committee before the next Council meeting. Deputy Kirby was introduced to Council. The meeting will be held at 6:00 on June 16th to hear some suggestions from Deputy Kirby.

Discussion was held on extra patrols for last day of school. Sgt. Haensler did not feel that it would be much of a problem if it is like last year.





Monday, June 16, 1997; Some 83 years have passed since Manchester witnessed the passing of some of the vehicles which were seen on our streets this day. Cars from as far away a Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana rolled down our now-paved roadways. These vehicles will be touring local villages and cities within a one days' journey of Tecumseh.

The Veteran Motor Car Club of America, Local Tecumseh Chapter is headed by Mr. Clem Campbell. Over 40 old one- and two- cylinder automobiles were on this touring display. To be a part of this group, your vehicle must be titled as a 1914 or older model. Some of the manufacturers represented were Brush, Buick, Cadillac, Darrarq, Mason, Maxwell, Renault, REO, Oldsmobile. The oldest vehicle was a 1901 Curved dash Oldsmobile. The Darrarq, not a commonly known vehicle, was a 1909 model.

The 1904 Curved Dash Oldsmobile, owned by Sue Neller of Williamston, will be featured in a movie recreation of the 1905 Transcontinental Race, to be released in August this year. This race started in Hells Gate, New York and went to Portland, Oregon. A grand prize of \$1,000.00, went to the winner. Although this particular vehicle did not participate in the actual race, it was a represtrentative of many of the vehicles included in the race. Only 105 of this model were ever manufactured.

At the time of the race no transcontinental roads existed, and hard surfaced roads between cities were not to be found. One of the purposes of the Transcontinental Race was to determine if it was viable to build roads for transcontinental auto travel.

It seemed fitting to have these old fashioned cars in our old-fashioned village, if only for a day. They will be passing through again Wednesday, enroute to spend a day in Chelsea.


