




There has been no sign of the Great Chicken as of press time Tuesday. The headquarters of the Manchester Chicken Broil hasn't had any contact with him either.



Board agenda was accepted with a new structure of Priority business items. Minutes were read and corrected. Washtenaw County Drain Commissioner Janis Bobrin presented an overview on the Drain Commissions Stonnwater Management issues and County Drains. The board reviewed the drains in the township and the maintenance work. Bills were paid and treasurers report was accepted.

Planning Commission reported on a Public hearing for a Conditional Use request for Jon and Vicky Sweet to operate a public riding stable to be held on July 14, 1997. Board agreed to have the consultants review and create the necessary applications for the new zoning ordinance.

The Manchester Fire Contract was discussed and a counter offer made to the township of a proposed payment of 50% of population and S.E.V. for

Board accepted the resignation of Greg Weidmayer from the Mineral License Board. David St. Clair was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Supervisor updated the board on the Haul Route meeting in June, the newly signed WCRC contract, and the tree removal off the township cemetery property.

Comments from the audience were in concern of discharge of firearms in the township on Clinton Road. Board suggested that the resident talk to the county authorities for help in this situation.









# **Gypsy Moths Update**

There have been sightings in both Jackson County and Washtenaw County of Gypsy moths, so we felt this update would be worthwhile to our readers.

As schools have let out for the summer and parents take time off from work, many summer plans call for a family vacation or time when people can leave to catch up on some needed rest and relaxation. Whether you are driving on the highways to a far off land, traveling throughout the state of Michigan or even Washtenaw county, one important step in traveling is to make sure you are not carrying the gypsy moth in any of its life stages with you. The word "gypsy" in gypsy moth is given to this pest for its ability to move from place to place by people, as did the gypsies of yesteryear in their travels from town to town.

When driving to or from an area that has a gypsy moth infestation, keeping the unwelcomed guests from tagging along is crucial in keeping uninfested areas free of the nuisance pest. Those people who own a cabin in gypsy moth infested areas in the north, need to be especially watchful and careful so they don't unknowingly bring them home. Underneath the car, camper or trailer are key places to search, as is fire-

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wood, or any outdoor materials hauled to your property.

A large gypsy moth caterpillar can find a perfect hiding place under a vehicle to begin its pupation process. This brown cocoon can stay attached to a vehicle long enough to be brought back to your home after the vacation has concluded.

In August, keeping an eye out for tan male moths and white female moths is equally as important. At the end of August, the female moth can lay a tan colored egg mass one to three inches long carrying 300 to 1000 eggs. The large female moths many times search out a safe place to lay egg masses, hence, cracks and crevices on or under vehicles or outdoor articles, such as underneath the arms of lawn chairs, should be key areas for a concerned individual to look.

Any gypsy moth life forms that are found need to be destroyed when seen. Scraping any stage of the gypsy moth on to the ground is not sufficient enough for it to be destroyed. Soapy water, household bleach, or ammonia are a few substances to scrape the caterpillars, pupae, moths, and egg masses into. By taking the necessary steps mentioned above, everyone can take the important responsibility of keeping the gypsy moth from moving into new locations.

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
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

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
