



## The Carrs and Carr Park

When everyone flocked to Carr Park for the Independence Day fireworks show two weeks ago, in their excitement, they probably did not think much about why the park was there, nor the history of the park. In truth, this area on West Main Street has both a fascinating past and a promising future.

Brothers William and Elijah Carr were among the earliest settlers of Manchester and they owned quite a bit of land, including the area that is now Carr Park. The site was once the location of a brick kiln, two houses and a cider mill.

Cornelius B. Carr, the son of William and Mary Ann Rowley Carr, was born in a log house north of the barns on the homestead of the Parr family on West Austin Road. According to the History of Manchester Township as recorded by Jane Palmer, Cornelius was "a solitary boy, always dignified, and with a way of his own."

The Sanborn family lived across the hills from the Carrs. Jane Palmer writes that the oldest Sanborn daughter was "an object of interest" to Cornelius. The girl's name was Nelly, and her family attended the Presbyterian church, as did Cornelius. Eventually, the two were married and they lived on the Carr family's property.

The brick kiln on the property was never much utilized by Cornelius and was therefore moved to the Schaible farm, along with

the brick makers. However, Cornelius operated the cider mill for years, producing cider, vinegar, and jelly for the citizens of Manchester.

Jane Palmer writes, "Carr's was a delightful place with a garden and orchard and a lane across the marsh. The split rail fence had asparagus in the corners and they gathered morels in May. On the hill north of the marsh there is a little wild land where dogwood and witch hazel and wintergreen keep their secrets."

Because Cornelius and Nelly had no children, they planned to leave something to the community. They were rumored to have considered a hospital location, but instead their legacy of land was turned into the playground area now known as Carr Park, of which everyone felt they would approve.

The area is now used as not only a playground, but as a gathering place, a picnic area, a day camp, and of course, the setting for the annual Independence Day fireworks show. Carr Park also has two volleyball courts and a baseball diamond, which is used by local Little League baseball, softball, and T-ball teams.

It is the only park in Manchester designed with facilities for a variety of ages and activities. It is the village's major park because of this.

Possible plans for the park's future include a nature trail to utilize the wetlands area of the park, which would allow for nature observation and passive recreation for Manchester's citizens.





Mr. Frog did find his way back, and right now he is buying flowers for Caroline at the flower shop for their date at the most romantic resturant in Town.



serve Pen which was purchased by Manchester Machine at 1.00/lb (not pictured).




