You're my peaceful dove.


Turning onto Main Street



Celebrating Traditions

Celebrating traditions is a very important part of the Manchester Area Historical Society, symbolized by the Christmas Eve Village Luminaria, sponsored by the Society, and the Community Christmas Party where everyone is invited to join in carolling and sampling and exchanging Christmas cookies.

Another tradition began after the dedication of the John B. Swainson Room in the Blacksmith Shop in 1995. A decorated tree is

Swainson was a long

in 1994, John B. Swainson was a long time Manchester resident and member of the historical society who had served the citizens of the state of Michigan as a State

Senator, Lt. Governor and Governor of Michigan, Judge of Wayne County Circuit Court and State Supreme Court Justice. The Swainson Room was dedicated in the hope that Manchester friends and visitors would have an opportunity to get to know and admire John's accomplishments the way historical society

In previous years, a live tree was donated by Reno and Nancy Feldkamp, Society members, from their tree farm on Smyth Road in Sharon Township. However, because the lights could not remain lit when no one was at the Blacksmith Shop, the Society decided to accept the offer of another member of the Society, Sandy

Trolz, for a donation of a life-like tree from her 18th Century Shoppe. Sandy, as she has in previous years, decorated the tree.

Mrs. Alice Swainson contributed family ornaments of straw that she and her husband John had collected over the years. The straw ornaments were found at Swedish bazaars in Detroit and represented Alice's Swedish heritage.

Alice also contributed their family's red bead garland: Sandy's creativity took off from there. She used miniature flags to create a patriotic theme along with Old World Americana ornaments from her shop such as an Uncle Sam, and included small squares of paper on which were written excerpts from the eulogy at John's funeral delivered by State Attorney General Frank Kelley which described John's contributions to Michigan.

At the base of the tree rests the bugle that John had used as a boy scout, and then as a Eagle Scout, a goose decoy from his office at home, a favorite antique leather hat box and briefcase, and the flag which covered his coffin. Also included is a photo of John as he enlisted in the Army straight out of high school, a young man of eighteen years old.

Because the tree is not real, the Christmas lights are left on continually, so even if the Blacksmith Shop is closed you can peek in the windows during an evening stroll and see the display. However, to truly appreciate the nostalgia and sentiment Sandy has created, pick up your Luminaria supplies and visit the John B. Swainson Room during hours advertised at the Blacksmith Shop.


As the high school group went to the front and began singing "O Holy Night," I saw some people in the audience mouthing the words, while others wiped away a few stray tears.
