## ENTERPRISE CHANGES HANDS

Heritage Newspapers of Southgate has purchased *The Manchester Enterprise*. Today's is the last edition of the newspaper under the ownership of local businesswoman Teresa Benedict. Heritage Newspapers, owned by Heinz Prechter, an automotive pioneer and entrepreneur, also owns the *Chelsea Standard*, *Dexter Leader*, *Saline Reporter*, *Milan News-Leader*, as well as newspapers in Dearborn and the Downriver Detroit area and Monroe. The *News-Herald*, which circulates in the downriver area, has been named the best suburban weekly newspaper for five consecutive years. Total circulation of all Heritage Newspapers is 380,000.

Interviewed by the staff of the *Enterprise*, Ms. Benedict said that she reached the decision to sell the *Enterprise* after a lengthy and difficult period of consideration. "After Heritage Newspapers approached me for a second time, I realized that perhaps the time had come for me to concentrate on developing Calamity Jane's. It was increasingly hard to devote enough attention

to two businesses, because I wanted both to be as good as possible." Ms. Benedict added she received "every assurance" from Heritage that close ties to the greater Manchester community would be continued.

"We are delighted to have the opportunity to serve the Manchester area and look forward to delivering even more local news," said Heritage Media President Fred Manuel.

*The Manchester Enterprise* was first published on October 17, 1867 by George Spafford. Within a year, Mat D. Blosser, a partner from the beginning, had purchased the paper, where he remained as editor and publisher until retiring in 1939, at age 93, after 72 consecutive years in the business.

Following Blosser's tenure, the *Enterprise* went through several changes of ownership through the years, including a period when it was owned in common with the *Saline Observer* and the *Milan Leader*. After a close call in 1971, when hard times threatened to close the newspaper, the *Enterprise* was acquired by Simon and Lenore Steele who owned the paper until 1991, when Emory Garlick and Don Limpert purchased it.

Manuel Continued, "At Heritage Newspapers, we understand schools; and community interests are best served when local news is the foundation of information available in the local newspaper. We intend to continue to have a local office in Manchester, while at the same time expanding newspaper services to the people of Manchester and surrounding townships.

"Heritage Newspapers believes in high-quality community journalism and we will work diligently to earn the respect of the communities and community leaders we will be serving through the Manchester area."

Saturday was a productive day for the Manchester Band Boosters as they spent eight hours washing nearly twelve hundred vehicles. Quality control was tight, though, as supervised by the Band Booster parents and the Suds & Such crew, headed by Martin Authier of Saline. Authier complimented the Band Boosters on the students' work ethic and the organization of the car wash.

This event is the major fund raiser of the Band Boosters' year. The community's support of this effort is greatly appreciated!

To the many community businesses who provided financial support, coupons for our giveaway bags, and other help; the schools for allowing us the use of their facilities; and those who made pledges to the students; and all the band members and parents who came - Thank You ALL!

## Stocking the River Raisin

### One Fish, Two Fish...New Fish

A crowd encompassing at least four generations and several families gathered at the Furnace Street Bridge on Thursday night. The occasion - stocking some 2,000+ fish into the River Raisin.

Tim King of Ypsilanti, who spearheaded this project beginning in November 1998, was excited as his family and many others gathered at the river. His grandfather, Brownloe Garrett, has been bringing Tim to the River Raisin to fish since he was just a lad. Mr. Garrett currently lives with his son Randall at 400 Riverside Drive, along the river.

Many of the Garrett family members joined in reminiscing about bringing a cooler to the river and fishing along the Furnace Street bridge 20 and 30 years ago. This family tradition has waned somewhat in recent years along with the fish population.

And now, thanks in part to Tim's earnest efforts, his own two-year-old son, Kyle Andrew, will be able to come to Manchester to fish, and likely bring his own children along someday. Kyle, already an avid fisherman like his dad, was eager to tell me that he had caught four fish just the day before.

Along with 350 hybrid sunfish, and 100 bluegill, approximately 2100 channel catfish were added to the stretch of the river between the two dams in the Village this week. Within two years, these catfish will be ripe for catching and will provide sportsmen from around the area with ample reason to fish the River Raisin in Manchester.

The fish were purchased from the Spring Valley Trout Farm in Dexter and from Farley's Fish Farm who makes a visit to the Atlas store each year. Jim Kaercher of Spring Valley was extremely conscientious about making sure the fish were acclimated to the water temperature of the river and giving proper attention to their environment. Tim indicates that Kaercher has been helpful in offering advice and encouragement all along, for the duration of this project.

Tim was also enthusiastic about further stocking of the river, as he has just received another permit from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to stock with Walleye, Crappie, and Perch by December 1, 1999.

Tim is very appreciative of the wide ranging support he's received

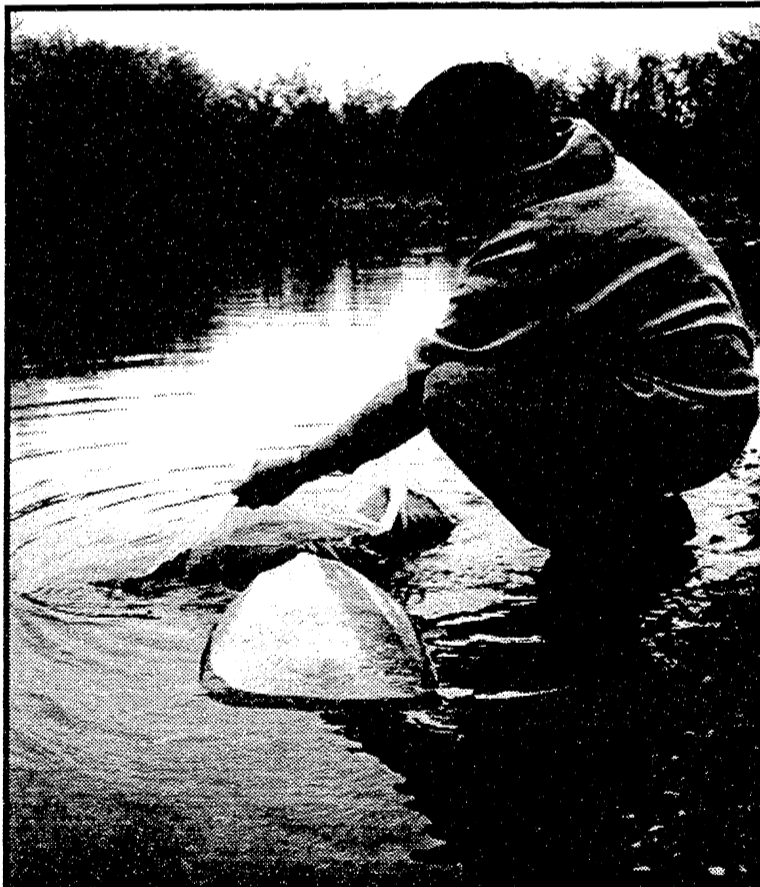
from local businesses and individuals over the past six months. Kleinschmidt True Value Hardware, Bridgewater Lumber, Manchester Market, Frank's Place, and Keith's Barber Shop, have all contributed space for the collection jars. Many individuals, including several members of the Garrett family, have made generous contributions. The River Raisin Watershed Council donated \$100 to the effort, thanks to Jim Mann, a local resident who has supported Tim in his quest to get the river stocked. Mann also made a personal donation to the cause. Tim's father, Clarence King, paid for the delivery.

During the next year, it is requested that local fishermen "catch and release" the channel catfish, to allow them to grow and spawn next spring. This will help assure a bountiful supply in the future.

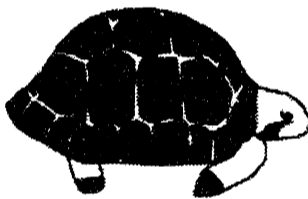

## Letter to the Editor

Friends,

During this beautiful month of May we anticipate the return of the migrant farm workers to work throughout the summer at the DuRussel Farms.

From May until the end of October families of migrant workers journey up to Michigan and many other states to help plant and harvest farm crops. It is this labor force by which many family growers are able to stay in business.

Most growers appreciate the benefit of having these nationally available workers that leave their home states of Texas, New Mexico, and Arizona arriving to work in the fields and orchards. Growers often establish a relationship of mutual respect and friendship with their workers providing housing and steady employment for the next four months.

Michigan ranks sixth in the nation for the number of migrant workers employed at about 13,000 seasonal workers with California at 34,000 and Texas with 31,000 heading the top 20 list of states. Florida, Washington, and North Carolina also precede Michigan.

Communities located in areas where migrant workers are employed prepare for their annual return with churches, schools, and social agencies planning summer programs for the migrant children as well as the adults. Local merchants realize a welcome increase in sales for many things besides food and clothing.

In our community of Manchester the younger children will be able to attend a summer school program and older migrant students will be able to attend evening classes at the DuRussel Farm to prepare for their GED and PAT qualifications.

St. Mary Church has a "hospitality program" offering Spanish Mass for the Catholic migrant families, catechesis for adults and children, and home visits in a welcoming outreach to the migrant families as members of our parish family while they are in residence.

We invite the people of our Manchester community to take part in this welcoming outreach by either getting personally involved in the hospitality program or simply offering a smile and hello to the farm workers when meeting them in stores or along the streets. ### Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department Manchester Deputies Declares Zero Tolerance for Drivers with Unbuckled Children During Operation ABC Mobilization.

Manchester Village— Starting May 24th through May 31st, 1999, Manchester Village Sheriff Deputies are joining thousands of agencies nationwide in the next wave of the *Operation ABC Mobilization: America Buckles Up Children* - declaring zero tolerance for drivers with unbuckled kids. Throughout the week leading up to Memorial Day, drivers who don't buckle up children will be stopped and enforcement action will be taken.

Despite laws requiring children to ride buckled up in Michigan and in every state, 6 out of 10 children killed in crashes are unbuckled. Tragically 2,087 children died in traffic crashes and nearly 320,000 were injured in 1997 nation wide. In 1997 Michigan had a total of 72 child fatalities related to accidents. Many of these deaths and injuries could have been prevented if the driver had just seen to it that the child was buckled up.

"Because adults are breaking the law, children are being crippled and killed in car crashes every day," said Janet Dewey, Executive Director of the Air Bag & Seat Belt Safety Campaign. "Every child in the nation should be protected by being properly restrained. That's why we are calling for zero tolerance for drivers with unbuckled kids in every state every day of the year."

Despite the grim statistics, progress is being made in large part because of high visibility enforcement efforts like the *Operation ABC Mobilization*. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that the Mobilizations in 1998 played a key role in prompting more than 19 million more Americans to buckle up- the largest, single-year increase in seat belt use in eight years. The government estimates that if these Americans continue to wear their seat belts, 1500 lives will be saved this year.

Officers will also be stepping up enforcement of adult seat belt laws, because it's a proven fact that most adults who don't buckle up themselves, don't buckle up kids. Recent research finds that an unbuckled driver is three times more likely to restrain a child passenger.

#### Nationwide Observational Research

- When a driver is *buckled*, restraint use for children (0-15) is 86.9%
- When a driver is *unbuckled*, restraint use for children (0-15) is 23.7%

**Michigan**

- When a driver is *buckled*, restraint use for children (birth to 3) is 81%
- When a driver is *unbuckled*, restraint use for children (birth to 3) is 52%

The *Operation ABC Mobilization* is sponsored by the Air Bag & Seat Belt Safety Campaign and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and is part of an ongoing national initiative to increase belt use and save lives of all Americans.

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## Southwest Washtenaw Council Of Governments - Joint Planning Discussed

The Southwest Washtenaw Council of Governments agreed to recommend to their respective units a plan to address joint planning with the assistance of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission at the May 13 meeting. The Southwest Washtenaw Council of Governments includes representatives from Bridgewater, Freedom, Manchester and Sharon Townships, Manchester Village and Manchester Schools.

Jim Fish, Chair of the Bridgewater Township Planning Commission, briefed members on a recent meeting about regional planning. Ron Mann, Manchester Township Supervisor, Jeff Wallace, Village Manager, and Mr. Fish met recently with Mark McFadden, Director of the Planning Staff of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission. They talked extensively about the County's assistance to Chelsea area governments to achieve a much higher level of cooperative and joint planning.

The WCMPC staff has

helped the northwestern townships by providing data, developing issues for concentration and study, and helping to involve residents in a "vision for the future" effort to state common goals for future development. SWWCOG members generally approved the approach and decided they will ask their respective units for authority to move ahead along the same lines, with an ultimate goal of agreeing in the future about common and joint planning in critical areas. The question of who would lead the

planning effort - the County or a private firm retained by SWWCOG member governments - was left open.

There was also a discussion of the County's proposed well and septic ordinance, with a general conclusion that it is unnecessary at this time. A public hearing on the proposed ordinance will be held May 19 at 6:45 PM in the Board Room of the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners, 220 N. Main Street, Ann Arbor. The comment period closes on May 21. -WF

## Next Book for Discussion Combines History, Adventure and Politics: *Undaunted Courage*

The Friends of the Manchester Township Library Book Discussion Group gathered last week to examine the book the group had previously chosen, *The Shipping News* by E. Annie Proulx, the 1994 Pulitzer Prize winner for Fiction. It is a darkly comic, wonderfully inventive work which all the readers in the group liked, despite the fact that the main character, Quoyle, is a schlump of a loser, not attractive, witty or talented. He goes from a loveless childhood to a loveless marriage that he can't get over. Aunt Agnis, who has all the gumption her nephew lacks, moves the family to their ancestral home in Newfoundland to start a new life. The author spices up this melodrama with local color and lore and a comedy of errors that all found enticing. Her stream of consciousness writing style was thought provoking and the character development endearing.

Despite enthusiasm for the book discussions, it was agreed that we would take the summer off. This would allow time to read a more "challenging" book. A History!

The recommended choice, *Undaunted Courage*, is a biography of Meriwether Lewis from the age of 18 to his fall after the famous expedition. It relies heavily on the daily

detailed journals of both Lewis and Clark and is interlaced with the author's personal experiences traveling along the Lewis and Clark route to the Pacific. Author, Stephen Ambrose, even offers his own alternative routes which he believes could have changed the history of America. He does not, however, just chronicle the events of the "Corps of Discovery" as the explorers called their venture, but paces the mundane with the unusual which entices the reader to turn another page. How the expedition negotiated with the Mandan, Sioux or Nez Perce and what they reported to Jefferson makes them come alive. Although still a hero, Lewis' problems that never make it into most history textbooks, prove that even heroes are human and are not always happy with themselves.

This historical adventure should prove good summer reading and the discussion will take place in September. The Manchester Township Library has copies available and can order the book through the inter-library loan. If you would like to reserve *Undaunted Courage* you can call the library at 428-8045. The Friends of the Library invites anyone to participate in the book discussions and welcomes any suggestions for future reading.

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## Village Planning Commission

Last Tuesday's Village Planning Commission meeting attracted a smaller crowd than April's Public Hearing when discussion was held on the proposals for rezoning the Central Business District and other areas of the Village. About a dozen citizens and a few Council members attended the meeting which was held in the Village Hall.

At the April 13 meeting, Village Manager Jeff Wallace was asked to consult with Planning Consultant Richard Carlisle, regarding requirements for unused space within the village and any limitations that may be placed on Kirk Park.

Wallace reported back to the commissioners that according to the General Law Village Act, provides that a public park shall not be sold without the consent of a majority of the electors of the village voting on the question at an election. Therefore, a referendum would be needed in order to sell the property in the future.

There are also no ratios or qualifiers to the amount of Mobile Home Park or Manufacturing to the population or area of a community. According to Wallace, "Guidelines are set by the community on how much and what kind of growth they would like to see. As long as you provide for it, you have covered your responsibility. It is up to us on how much growth we want to provide for."

Property previously zoned "Agricultural" within the village limits was eliminated. This has instead been rezoned to R-1A (low density, single family homes). This section of the zoning map was approved by the commission to be recommended to Village Council

Islands of greater density apartments & Condos currently exist within areas zoned as single family.

The lower density zoning was approved. However, it will not affect current use, and current apartments are allowed to continue in this district until the property is sold.

Expansion of the Central Business District down Clinton Street, from Ockrow into Kirk Park. Also includes the Comerica parking lot, and Duncan St. between Clinton and Riverside. The park was taken out of the equation, and left zoned as R-1B. The remaining properties (including seven homes) are recommended to be zoned as Central Business District.

The zoning classification of C-3 was eliminated, and changed to C-2, mainly so the zoning code book will match our map. The only area affected was the area of the Manchester Market.

The C-1 (Office) designation on the west side of Riverside and on City Road at Hibbard, were both approved on a 4-3 vote.

Those pockets zoned I-3 were eliminated in favor of an I-2 designation, again to match the new codebook. "This will limit very heavy industrial use, such as foundries and stamping plants," explained Wallace. "It will help keep a cleaner town."

The "Daubner property," currently zoned Agricultural, was slated to be zoned to I-1 on Parr/Sooten Rd. This aspect was taken out of plan. This was considered one of the most controversial issues in the plan, next to the rezoning of the Park. According to the recommendations made by Carlisle, there is no need to zone empty land as industrial if not desired. The major intent in this case was to avoid "spot zoning."

The recommendation of the Planning Commission will go to Council at a June meeting for review and a final determination.

## Manchester Township Receives Application For Senior Mobile Home Park At M-52 & Bowens

Owner Marvin N. Swope of Plymouth Michigan and C.S.T. LLC have applied to rezone 71.53 acres from agricultural to mobile home park. The park would be located off M-52, bounded by Allen Road to the south, Bowens to the north and Van Tuyle to the west. Entrance to the proposed park would be from Allen Road.

The application was made on May 11 and will be brought up at the May 20 Planning Commission meeting.

The application states the sites will be for double wide mobile homes for a senior community, restricted to those 55 and older. It proposes a density of about five homes per acre. It also proposes that an old barn located on the property would be converted to a clubhouse where daily activities would be available to senior residents. -WF

## County Planners Recommend Denial Of Large Mobile Home Park in Sharon

The Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission recommended last week that rezoning for a 178-acre mobile home park in Sharon Township be denied. The Sharon Township Planning Commission voted on March 25 to recommend the application be turned down. The Sharon Township Board will make the final decision, but no date has been set for action.

The mobile home park proposed by the Landon Company of Southfield, Michigan would have included 693 sites for mobile homes. The potential addition of about 1700 people to the Township's population of 1600 would more than double the Township's population within a few years. Margarethe Kozminiski, a resident of Florida, owns the site.

According to Roger Kappler, Chair of the Sharon Township Planning Commission, "The county Planning Commission said that a mobile home park of that size was completely inconsistent with planning by Sharon Township and adjacent townships, including Lima and Sylvan. There's been a lot of effort to do good regional planning in this area." Mr. Kappler also pointed out that the Township had already identified an area near Manchester for a potential mobile home park.

The March 18 public hearing on the application drew a crowd of over 100 people opposed to the rezoning request.

Across southeast Michigan, there have been several applications by various companies to rezone agricultural areas to create large mobile home parks. The surge has led to increasing calls to reform the State's Mobile Home Commission Act, passed in 1987. Senator Alma Wheeler Smith and Representative Ruth Jamnick have proposed legislation that would lessen the authority of the Commission to override local concerns about mobile home parks.

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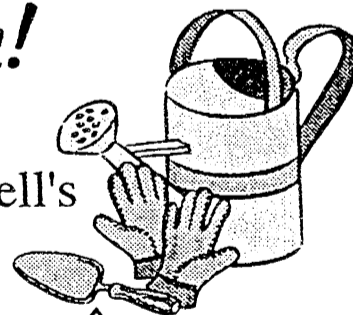

**PASS - Passes it on!**

**QUESTION:** My child was tested by the school to see why he/she was having difficulty in school; what are the tests testing for?

When a student is having difficulty in school, a parent or teacher may ask that the student be evaluated to see if a specific problem can be found. Call your student's principal to learn how to request an evaluation.

The evaluation process is a series of tests. The types of tests used will vary from student to student depending on the student's age and the type of difficulty he/she is having. It is important that the primary cause, not the secondary symptom, is found. For example, you may think your child has an attention problem, but the real cause may be a learning disability.

Here are the six types of tests given and the names of some of the specific tests in each type. If your child is given a test not included here, ask the school evaluation team what type of test it is.)

1. **Intelligence and Readiness Tests:** Goals are to measure the student's knowledge, ability and readiness to perform higher-level tasks. These tests may be given more than once (or are spread out over many days); inconsistency can indicate a learning disability. NOTE: It is often difficult to get an accurate reading on students with a history of classroom failure. Test names include: Stanford-Binet Intelligence Scale, Wechsler Intelligence Scale for Children Revised (WISC-R), Peabody Picture Vocabulary Test.

2. **Perceptual Development Tests:** Goals are to measure the student's fine or gross motor skills, to look at the relationship between motor skills and visual perception and to evaluate memory skills. For example, the student may be asked to copy a figure and to draw a stick figure. Test names include: Slosson Drawing Coordination Test, Illinois Test of Psycholinguistic Abilities (ITPA), Beery Visual-Motor Integration Test.

3. **Speech and Language Tests:** Goals are to determine the

student's ability to communicate how well he/she distinguishes and reproduces sounds, ability to express language verbally, ability to match an object or concept with its name and ability to understand abstract and concrete language. Test names include: Goldman-Fristor Test of Articulation, Expressive One-Word Picture Vocabulary Test (EOWPVT), Test of Language Development (TOLD).

4. **Achievement Tests:** Goals are to determine what the child has learned so far in many academic areas. These tests are often used to measure your child's achievement compared to other children of the same age. Test names include: Woodcock-Johnson Psychoeducational Battery, Revised (WJ-R), Detroit Tests of Learning Aptitudes, Wide Range Achievement Test -R (WRAT-R), Gray Oral Reading Tests -Revised.

5. **Emotional Development and Personality Tests:** Goals are to measure a student's emotional make up. These are administered by a psychologist and parental input is very important prior to testing. Test names include: Draw-A-Person Test, California Test of Personality, Tasks of Emotional Development.

6. **Neurological Tests:** Goals are to determine attention and concentration disorders such as those characteristic of ADD. Administered by a qualified neuropsychologist. Test names include: Retian-Indiana Neuropsychological Test Battery, Connor Scale of Hyperactivity and Conduct Problems, ANSER System.

### Fabulous Flowering Crabs

This has been a wonderful year for crab apples to show off their gorgeous blooms. By now the flowers are starting to fade, partly due to the strong, drying winds we've had recently when they were in their prime. But, it's not too late to plant yours for next spring.

Crab apples come in a wide range of shapes and sizes so every yard with a sunny spot has room for one or more. The flowers on these trees can be pure, snow white to pink to red to rose. So, it can be hard to choose only one. Even the leaves can be shiny green, dark maroon, frosted or red tipped.

Varieties now are bred to produce persistent fruit. In other words the tiny apples they produce, which are also colorful (red, yellow, or green) hang onto the tree well into winter and don't litter the ground as often remembered. They look like tiny ornaments when the tree is bare. The apples become soft and fermented in late winter, at that

time they are a great food source for returning birds.

Crab apples are quite adaptable to soil conditions, but do best in heavy loam. What ever soil you have, it should be moist and well drained. Those with clay and sandy ground, add lots of peat moss and soil conditioner and your crabs will do fine.

They are also extremely hardy and need little pruning to maintain their shape. Some varieties are wide spreading and grow to 25 feet, which makes a nice medium size shade tree for the home. Others have been grafted to produce small tiny trees perfect for patio accents. Weeping crab apples cascade their colors like an umbrella.

Few other trees and shrubs can compete with the versatility of the crab apple tree. So, if you don't have a crab in your landscape now, head for your local garden center and take home a few. Next spring, you'll be glad you did.
