SWWCOG reps examine need for senior housing

Farmland preservation also a hot topic at November meeting.

Chalk up another re-polishing of the planning map covering the four townships bordering and including the village of Manchester.

The latest draft was presented at the Nov. 14 meeting for the Southwest Washtenaw Council of Governments (SWWCOG) at Manchester Community

The new map takes into consideration concerns over the drawing of farmland districts, and will reflect issues of natural resource overlay districts and the need for community-wide senior housing in upcoming versions.

Erin Perdu, principal planner from the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, helped present the newest version of the map with help from colleague Michal Russo. The redrawn map responded specifically to comments fielded at the Oct. 10 SWWCOG meeting in which some representatives argued for extending prime agricultural preservation districts.

Perdu said prime agricultural districts in Freedom Township were increased 'quite a bit" on the newest map, which also extended such districts into northeast Sharon and parts of Bridgewater

SWWCOG CHAIR Jim Fish described the adjustments as "minor adaptations"

"It's still a draft, and I think that's what people have to understand," he said. Until we decide, it's still a draft.

Going the extra mile is right in character for Cheryl Call, who coordinates the migrant education program at Manchester Community Schools, Her colleagues have long recognized the dedication she shows to the migrant students and their families, and now Call has received statewide recognition as well.

Last Thursday, Call received Michigan Education Association's Excellence in Migrant Education Award at the organization's annual instruction and professional development conference held at the Hyatt Regency in Dearborn. This prestigious award is presented to an educator who has made significant contributions to the education and well-being of migrant students and their

John McGuire, principal at Klager Elementary School, nominated Call for her involvement in the summer and fall migrant program which runs from May

through October.

"IT'S A nice recognition of her efforts." McGuire said. "She does a wonderful job.

McGuire has ample opportunity to watch Call at work. The summer program, designed for children up to age 12, is based at Klager and the majority of students served in the migrant education program attend Klager School.

Between 50 and 60 familiesabout 200 people in all-travel to Manchester each summer to work at DuRussel Potato Farms. The federally-funded migrant education program has expanded in scope over the years since its inception in 1985. and now includes services not only to the students but to the families as well.

FOR SIX weeks each summer. students attend school from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day, receiving both breakfast and lunch during the school day in a USDA open

The program focuses on academics, getting students up to grade level and keeping them there by the time the school years starts in late August.

They often have missed the last few weeks of school in Texas, because they left in April." Call said.

The program keeps regular school staff members involved so the students see familiar faces when they come to school in the fall.



High school administrators look at block schedule forn

■ Block scheduling format in district's future?

The schedule at Manchester High School has remained virtually unchanged for the past 16 years. But there could be changes in the instructional delivery and scheduling even before the advent of a new high school in fall 2004.

Currently, as part of the career pathways implementation grant received by the school district. the staff and students are looking at a variety of ways in which this option is being utilized in

schools around the state. High school principal John Eisley gave a presentation on the idea of block scheduling at the Nov. 19 school board meeting.

"In the 1983-84 school year a committee of staff members looked at the school's six-class schedule, and determined that we needed additional classes,' he said.

At that time, the school went to a seven-period instructional day.

Now, as instructional delivery needs have evolved, the need for change is again being consid-

"We're researching the pros and cons," Eisley said. "We've had three different guest speakers talk about the variety of different scheduling options. Teachers have attended confer-

"It's also our goal to have each staff member visit a block scheduling school. We're in the process of organizing this."

Eisley explained that a student's career pathway can help determine the scheduling and the courses that will provide hands-on experience in their chosen pathways.

In addition, block scheduling provides more focused time for instruction, and allows teachers additional time to utilize a greater variety of teaching methods. It is basically a different for-

mat for instructional delivery. "They could lecture, have a group project, and do an experiment, still having time for discussion at the end of a class period," Eisley said. "There is less interruption, and the staff has

ber of students. There's more opportunity for relationship building in a block-scheduling format.

Currently, the seven-class schedule has students taking 47minute class hours. Block scheduling would double up the time period, providing four classes of 80 to 90 minutes, called a "four by four block," that would meet for 18 weeks and be equivalent to the 47-minute classes meeting daily for a traditional 36-week

school year. the Αt semester break, the students would change courses. the format of college level class-



an eight-by-eight format, classes would be scheduled on alternate

days for a full year.
"With rapid changes in technology, and trying to get the students on a career pathway, we have to find more time to deliver

The major advantages to block scheduling, according to Eisley. include .the relationship-building aspect, the teachers having fewer students to work with and consequently less grading to do. In addition, he said, the students can take advantage of a "seminar

for club meetings, tutoring, providing information or added academic help.

Disadvantages could include added staff costs, as more staff may be needed to implement

"With a budget freeze put on by governor, that's a concern," Eisley said. "We don't know whether the district can afford

Practical issues also would need to be solved in order to implement the block-scheduling option. Added staff and a correspondingly larger budget would eventually be needed.

"We can't just take the staff we have and plug them into a block schedule," he said.

In addition, the change would involve more professional development and training for staff.

"You really need a consensus of at least 80 percent of the staff for such a program to work," Eisley said. "The staff has to be on board, believe in the format and be willing to work together.

Eventually we'll have to vote on this and see if it is something that would be best for our students.

Eisley said that whatever decision is made, it would not be made concurrent with the move to a new high school.

"We visited a district last year that was moving into a brand new high school, and also implementing block scheduling," he said. "It was too much of a shock to the staff, students and even parents.

"We wouldn't want to do both

in the same year.

Eisley said the administration will make use of the time and financing provided by the Career Pathways grant, to fully research the scheduling options available.

Ultimately, the administration

and staff are most cerned with what needs to be done to prehigh pare dents future employment in their chosen pathways.

future." he said. Asked how changing to block scheduling might affect students in the South and West Washtenaw Consortium programs. Eisley was uncertain.

"The consortium went to a four-by-four block schedule a few years ago." he said. "It has affected our current scheduling. so if we work around it, we may

actually find it fits in better as long as we are on the same time schedule as they are.

He stated that with 50 students currently participating and midway through a five-year contract with SWWC, consortium courses would be a major focus as the

administration looks at block scheduling option.

Among staff members who have visited blockscheduling schools, there has been an

enthusiastic response. "One teacher enjoyed her visit

so much that she went back again," Eisley said.

In the next two months, the entire high school staff is expected to make visits to schools that utilize block scheduling.

At the school board meeting. secretary Monty Okey noted that as the district looks at a fixed income for the coming year and an uncertainty about future funding, this factor might be the largest stumbling block to implementing a new method of instructional delivery.

"The board is always willing to look at any methods that would facilitate education in the district," Okey said. "But it's my understanding that it may cost more money depending on the type of blocks that you have.

"Presently the schools are at a fixed income, as far as state funding for this year. We fortunately did not have any cutbacks in the foundation grant for this year, but next year it is uncertain as to whether or not state funding for public schools will

be the same, or less. "Hence, the board needs to look carefully at the overall cost for this endeavor.



Freedom Township puts gravel woes to back burner

Activity on the Steinbach Road gravel pit known as the Kuebler Pit in Freedom Township took a back seat to other township matters at the township board's November

Rob Martin, owner of C and T Trucking, has been operating the pit for the past several months but does not currently hold a permit.

Freedom Township Supervisor Bob Little said that Martin currently is getting paperwork in order to make application for a mining per-

Martin has pledged to take care of a two-acre section of the west face of the pit where he has mined, and will bond that at \$50,000.

"Martin is working with the township." Little said. "It's a rather lengthy process."

The township board briefly discussed policing matters. As

of Jan. 1, the township will be going with state police protec-

"We can't afford (to hire a sheriff's deputy)." Little said. 'That's about a third of our

Little said he didn't think the residents would see much change, other than that the state police units would be the first responders to non-emergency calls within the town-

"We didn't see a lot of sheriff's patrol as it was," he said.

Bob Miller has become the township's volunteer historian. After researching the history of his farmhouse on Hieber Road. Miller became interested in further documenting the history of the township.

"It's quite interesting," Little said. "He's talked to a lot of the old-timers around here.

"I think it's going to be great." The regularly scheduled township board meeting will follow an open house, set for 7 p.m. Tuesday.

History project progresses

meeting on Dec. 11 as a time to display the history project materials gathered during the past year. The open house will begin at 7 p.m.

Materials include historical information on the four churches in the township, the current town hall, the Pleasant Lake Inn, genealogical materials. schools, cemeteries and other materials. A very old ballot box of the township will help the public see how our forefathers handled elections.

Of special interest will be the old maps of the township. Maps from the Washtenaw county atlas of 1915 and 1874 will be present. Thanks to the generosity of Elaine Watson, a township map of 1856 will be on display. This map was once owned by her father, a long time township resident and officer, Will

I will tend to agree with Miss Potter on this issue.



Medicare muddle misses the mark of 'care'

I've just spent the last six weeks in the elderly-parentwith-a-stroke, hospital, rehab. Medicare/ home. Medicaid nightmare. And while the experience is far from over. I think I've had a lifetime of mishaps in these few short

Just as I had written before of my own experience with cancer and know what only those that have done it know, now I can commiserate with caregivers

First, I must say that the people involved have for the most part been very kind and professional. The nurses, social workers and therapists all seem to rapidly bond with those needing care, and this is good because the system really doesn't let you sit still for long. I use the term "the system" to somewhat lovingly refer to the fact that at certain points in care, it doesn't matter what the patient or the

The very night of my mom's stroke was the first introduction to the system. Her family doctor told her to tell the ambulance to take her to the hospital at which he had privileges. My mom, of course, ended up several hospitals away and to this day hasn't been under the care of her family doctor of 30 years: "the system" won't let that happen yet.

Her new doctor at the hospital released her to her home with

draw my own conclusions...

no idea that she lived alone in a senior complex. A good man, no doubt, but when the system says you are good to go, you go.

My mom had a relapse in a few days and on the day I arrived to take her to her new doctor's check-up, the system said, "if you want to enter rehab. you have to do it today." So off we went, thinking a 30-day rehab was in store. Of course, that's what my mom and I wanted.

No way, Jose. Rehab is now a seven-to-ten day experience, no more, period. So we immediately learned that another move was undoubtedly in store for us. The system, in the form of the social worker, said we would talk on the next Thursday or Friday to talk of future placement, whether that be home or nursing home. Fine. I thought. That gave me a timetable to get some things done that I had put off for the last few weeks.

You lose again if you think

that's how it worked out. The system said we weren't going to talk on Friday. Mom was moving on Friday and if I didn't do the moving, they would. At this point, social workers were not my favorite people.

So now the mom is in a nursing home, getting the therapy she needs, but is all well and good? Of course not: we thought her insurance provided nursing home coverage, but it doesn't. So the system says that by Dec. 6 we must again decide between home, private pay at the nursing home, or Medicaid.

By this point, the system has now got me in the "just roll me over and shoot me" mode. They

the entirety of two weeks to learn all I can about Medicare and Medicaid and all the little. very important rules. The rules that if you break one, you could lose your parents' life savings.

I am venting all this on the population of Manchester because you must realize in your own lives that you need someone to at least try and help you. My mom has her friends from the senior building and me. But otherwise, all this would happen stroke or serious illness. And if the stroke don't kill you. dealing with "the system" just might.



School foundation is meeting needs in new ways.

The Manchester Community Schools Foundation was formed last year "to provide a brighter future" for students in the Manchester schools.

And that brighter future already is becoming a reality as the foundation begins to fulfill its three-fold mission of providing mini-grants to teachers for special projects, adding technology and software to enhance classroom lessons, and funding specialty programs not in the curriculum.

The foundation already has raised more than \$15,000 to strengthen Manchester students' educational experiences.

Twice annually, the foundation will receive mini-grant requests from teachers with a goal of having new projects each semester. The first series of grant requests was received Nov. 1 and three recipients were announced this week.

"One of the big things we look at when deciding which grants to approve is the number of students impacted," said Mary Ann Fielder, a retired teacher and a trustee of the foundation. "Two of the three applications will be used for years to come.

These projects include a set of Suzuki Tone Chimes to be used in third and fourth-grade music classes at Klager school, and listening centers for four third and

fourth-grade classrooms also at

The listening centers will allow educators to support all students participating in literacy programs, accelerated reader, science and social studies, by providing special assistance and added independence to auditory learners, bilingual students and those who read below grade level. The Manchester Men's Club funded this grant thanks to a generous donation to the foundation.

The tone chimes were requested by music teacher Sandi Graff and will provide an enriching musical experience for third and fourth-grade students for years to come.

A third request came from Marianne Sachs, art instructor at the Nellie Ackerson Middle School. Sachs requested funding to supplement the current art budget at the middle school, and will use the grant to purchase materials and tools for the students in grades five through eight to create wire sculptures.

Stephen Kopka, an Ann Arbor artist whose whimsical wire sculptures appeal especially to children, will help lead a workshop to introduce students to the art of three-dimensional wire sculpture

"Materials for this project will be single use, but the workshop will reach a large number of students," Fielder said.

Foundation treasurer Colleen Kemner said that the group received several other requests that it could not finance at this

"We are looking for more sources for funding," she said. "This is an ongoing process and we had pretty good request for the first go-around.

"We expect even better response from here on out."

Fielder added that once the teachers see grants really are forthcoming, the foundation expects to see a wider participation of requests in coming semesters.

All equipment purchased by the grants should be in use by the beginning of the second semester. Grant requests for Fall 2002 will have a June 1 deadline.

Money donated to the foundation goes directly to assist the schools.

"With the current method of school funding, there are so many things the schools can't do," Fielder said. "We'd like to provide extra things the teachers want to do but can't manage within the regular budget.

"The foundation will benefit students and teachers, encouraging teachers to be more creative. It also will benefit the community as a whole-with schools of choice, we want to make Manchester as attractive a district as possible."

Kemner added that many area schools, including Chelsea and Saline, have foundations that help to fund a wide variety of special programs each year.

A total of seven requests were submitted by the Nov. 1 deadline for the second semester of this Fielder and Kemner say is encouraging to the foundation.

'Considering the size of our staff, that's a really good representation," Fielder said.

"Even though we're currently only funding these three, as we get more money we may be able to provide more mini-grants before the next round of requests.

Brochures introducing the foundation were handed out at parent-teacher conferences in early November, and several donations were received in response. Kemner added.

We'd like to thank the people who have donated as a result," she said. "This helped us to fund the three mini-grants already."

The group has applied for 501c3 status, and currently is running under the umbrella of the Lenawee Community Foundation. Donations to the foundation are fully tax-deductible, and those made before Dec. 31 may be claimed on 2001 state and federal income taxes

The foundation's goal is to continue providing Manchester students with the ability to learn and dream larger than what current budgets will allow. according to its brochure. This year's

METEOR SHOWER, Dec. 13-14

The Gemenid meteor shower, "Old Faithful" of the night sky. consistently provides a shooting star display in mid-December every year. This is a popular one to watch because the shower is visible at a reasonable hour.

A few hours after sundown (around 10 p.m.) on Dec. 13. observers should bundle up for the weather and look toward the eastern sky, near the wellknown constellation Orion. The meteors will seem to radiate from the constellation Gemini. to Orion's left. The shower is predicted to peak at 11 p.m. with rates up to 80 meteors per

SOLAR ECLIPSE, Dec. 14


For a short time on Dec. 14, Midwest observers will be able to see part of the sun's annular. or "ring" eclipse, where the

moon's shadow blots out the center of the sun, leaving only the outer ring visible.

This eclipse will be strongest in Hawaii, where about 85 percent of the sun will be blocked out. But towards the end of the day, the partial eclipse will be visible in the Midwest. Be sure to use solar filters and safe viewing techniques or your eyes are at serious risk







the issue stems from complaints from area seniors that currently are forced to move outside of the southwest Washtenaw community to find the assisted care facilities that they need.

"They'd like to stay in the community they live in," said Fish, because they know those communities, they know people

"We're suggesting that over time, the area ought to be looking at a continuum of senior housing availability, and adapting our plans and zoning to include that availability," he continued, "And that may include a full-care facility. We think that would benefit the community, by allowing them to stay in the community.'

He said the community must address the need for facilities that provide "less responsibility and more freedom.

Some text has already been added to the SWWCOG plan about senior housing, including strategies to provide for affordable and appropriate senior housing options. Perdu said. The distributed pamphlet also lists seven strategies for fostering independent living for seniors in the southwest Washtenaw region. They range from types of senior housing, such as accessory apartments and elder cottages, to monetary assistance, including rental assistance vouchers and home equity conversion loans, which can help turn home equity into a source of income.

Fish said the council asked Perdu to include more material on this subject in the next plan draft, which will be presented at the group's December meeting.

The board also discussed concepts for the natural resources section of the plan, including natural resource overlay districts, which establishes areas where sensitive natural features, such as woodlands or areas in which rare or endangered plants exist. would be set apart and spared from development.

Setbacks from flowing water, building around an old tree, or clustering development in one area of a site to spare natural features are examples of how the overlay district works.

Perdu said the board has stated its preference for this over setting aside large chunks of land as untouchable.

"In past meetings, it has been a real issue trying to balance private property rights and the need for open space and natural areas," she said. "That has been a pretty touchy subject in the past, but I think we're on the right track

Controversy, NFL follow Wisconsin record-holder.

With the final seconds ticking off the clock, the season came to an unfamiliar, early close for the Wisconsin Badger football squad in Minneapolis.

The 42-31 loss to the Minnesota Golden Gophers on Nov. 24. their seventh of the season, was enough to push Wisconsin out of bowl contention, the first time since 1995 the Badgers would stay home during the post-sea-

Inside the climate-controlled MetroDome stood wide receiver Nick Davis, Manchester alumnus and a senior at the University of Wisconsin.

"I had mixed emotions," said Davis of the game, his last in a red-and-white jersey. "I was obviously upset we lost. I didn't want to end my career here at Wisconsin on a losing note. But you've got to live with it."

Davis was coming off a game in which he had two receptions for 23 yards, two punt returns for 66 yards, and five kickoff returns totaling 117 yards. He also had a 70-yard punt return in the third quarter that nearly went for a

"I wouldn't say the season was disappointing overall," he said. "There was a whole lot of records that were broken by a bunch of players. But we didn't go to a bowl game, and we lost to some teams that we should have beat-

If the final game represented a less-than-remarkable season. Nick Davis' career was anything but that.

Davis will leave Madison as Wisconsin's all-time leading punt and kickoff returner, with 1,007 and 1,778 yards respectively. And with an additional 1,097 yards receiving. Davis is the first player in Wisconsin history to gain 1,000 yards in three categories.

He led the Big Ten in punt returns (1998) and kickoff returns (1999), and amassed 3,926 all-purpose yards for his four-year career. Davis was Wisconsin's inaugural offensive rookie of the year, and racked up 126 all-purpose yards in the season's 1998 Rose Bowl, a 38-31 upset over

Davis is also one of 10 finalists for the Mosi Tatupu Special Teams Player of the Year Award, voting for which will take place in December.

"It's a great honor to be even mentioned with those guys, some of the best special team players in the country," he said.

"I loved playing (at Wisconsin)," he said. "There's great people here, great coaches. great players. The support level was fantastic. The things I've learned here in four years, and the people I've met here ... I'll never forget it."

Certainly, Davis played on some excellent teams during his stay at Wisconsin, including the teams that won the Rose Bowl during his freshman and sophomore seasons, which Davis lists as the highlights of his Badger

And to be sure, it was no talent vacuum that allowed Davis to showcase his skills. He has played alongside players like Chris Chambers and 1999 Heisman Trophy winner Ron Dayne, both of whom now play in the NFL.

Cheryle Davis, his mother who

lives in Manchester, is probably one of his biggest fans.

"I'm very proud of him," she said. "He's accomplished a lot. And we all have heard that someone coming from a small town can't play in the Big Ten and at the Division I level.

"He's an example for kids that it can be done. If you have a dream, you have to follow it," she

Ask Manchester football coach Wes Gall about him, and he'll positively gush about Davis' achievements at Manchester High: most rushing yardage in year (1,883), touchdowns in a season (22), yards in a game (249), touchdowns in a game (five), and career rushing yardage (4,114).

He also had the longest interception returned for a touchdown (95 yards), led in all-purpose vardage in a season (2,238), all-purpose career yardage (5,483), and longest kick returned for a touchdown (82 yards).

"He was a hard worker, and probably used the weight room as well as anybody we'd ever had in terms of preparing for the season." Gall said, recalling Davis' daily 45-minute weight-training

get in to using weights. With him, you didn't have to. You didn't have to stand over top of him.

"I think in the position that he was in as tailback, yes, he was the best tailback we'd ever seen.'

Nick has been playing football since the seventh grade. In those days, his mother said, Davis was quiet, determined. A perfectionist. You never really knew where his head was at because he was so quiet."

"Anytime you go out for organized football starting in seventh grade, that's just building a foundation." Nick Davis said. "My number one goal was to go out there every day and get better.'

To his fellow prep football hopefuls. Davis had the following

"Don't let anybody ever teil you what you can and cannot do. I think that's the number one thing that holds kids down." he said

Davis said he was constantly being told he was too short, too slow, or not strong enough to succeed at the collegiate level. But he said he didn't believe them.

"It doesn't matter what other people say, it matters what you think about yourself." he said.

Unfortunately, Davis' standout career has a flip side. During his junior season, a pair of highly publicized incidents caused his reputation to take a beating.

Davis violated NCAA regulations in the summer of 2000 after it was discovered he purchased shoes for himself and family members at a Black Earth. Wisc.

shoe store at unauthorized discounts exceeding \$500. Davis was ordered to repay all open accounts and the amount of extra benefits received, and was suspended for three games that year. Twenty-five other players were also suspended for the discounts.

Later that season, Davis was involved in a scheme to illegally obtain a 38-inch RCA television from a Madison-area Best Buy store. After reportedly asking her to "hook him up" with the TV. friend and Best Buy employee Jenny Manikham created a false purchase order, which Davis used to have the TV delivered to his apartment. Manikham later voided the receipt, worth \$4,008.99. Company officials learned of the missing unit after conducting an audit, and soon after traced the set to Davis'

In December, after entering into a plea bargain with prosecutors. Davis pled guilty of misdemeanor retail theft after. He was placed on two-year probation, and was suspended from the team's 21-20 victory against UCLA in the Sun Bowl.

"I would say career-wise, they were low points," said Davis of the incidents. "But that's all a learning experience. You've got to take things for what they're worth sometimes.

"I learned more in those six months of my life than I have in the rest of it, and I think the important thing is to be able to walk away a better person.

He said some people even said

they were glad to see it happen.

He isn't sure why. You find out who your true friends are." he said.

What makes me most proud is how much he's grown up and become a man in terms of all the adversity he's gone through," said his mother, who was with her son and also received discounted shoes.

She said that had he purchased the shoes alone, he would never have gotten the suspension because of the small amount in value. But "because (we) purchased shoes and got a discount, he got the suspension." she said.

The whole thing was not a good deal. There isn't anybody who'd go to the store and say, 'no, I don't want a discount." "Did he pay a price? Yes, he

did." said Gall of the incident involving the television. "I think he handled it quite well, and he wanted to get back and play his senior season.

Davis said he has put the incidents behind him and is focusing on the future, which may involve more football. Gall has been busy replying to scouting questionnaire forms from the Oakland Raiders and the Washington Redskins.

"Because of his success at Wisconsin in punt and kick returning. I felt that was where he would be most likely to excel," said Gall. "He had great vision, he had cuts, and he has good



Billing changes at Consumers

Consumers Energy electric customers will see two new line items—but no additional charges-on December bills.

The new line items are required by the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC) to track utility financing costs associated with a 5 percent electric rate reduction that went into effect for residential customers in June 2000. The MPSC authorized the utility to issue lowercost financing to pay for the rate cut through a process called securitization. In order to track securitization costs more easily. directed the MPSC has

Consumers Energy to list these two line items on customer bills.

As part of Michigan's new electric restructuring law, residential electric rates were reduced by 5 percent last summer and will remain frozen at that level through 2003, and then capped through 2005.

Consumers Energy, the principal subsidiary of CMS Energy Corporation, is Michigan's largest utility providing natural gas and electricity to more than 6 million of the state's nearly 10 million residents in all 68 Lower Peninsula counties.

A preview of 2002 trucks and sport utility vehicles

If it isn't broke, don't fix it. That's what the folks at Acura, Honda's upper-end division, may have been thinking when it comes to the MDX sport utility vehicle, the SUV of the year by Motor Trend magazine.

The only changes for 2002 are added sound deadeners.

Like other car manufacturers. BMW felt the need some years ago to get into the SUV game.

For 2002, the X5, which looks more like an oversized wagon than a traditional SUV, gets a choice of three engines, the largest being an inline 4.6-liter that generates 347 horsepower. A GPS-based navigation system also becomes optional.

Buick might not have anything new when it comes to its lineup of cars.

However, it does have a muchwanted SUV in the 2002 Rendezvous. The Rendezvous shares the same frame and drivetrain of the Aztek. Unlike the Aztek, the Rendezvous keeps the all-wheel independent rear suspension. Buick's Rendezvous also will be available with an optional third seat for those who need extra seating capacity.

It wasn't too many years ago that Cadillac wouldn't have appeared anywhere on a truck and SUV preview. Now. GM's luxury wing has a pair of offer-

First launched in 1998, the second generation of Escalade debuted in the spring as a 2002 model. The Escalade is new inside and out, giving it a bigger stance, a more luxurious interior and a solid ride, thanks to a 345-horsepower, 6.0-liter engine.

Complementing the Escalade this year is the all-new Escalade EXT, a luxury pickup truck. Built off the Avalanche platform (see below), the EXT offers the same midgate technology, allowing it to be changed from a true pickup to an SUV with a cargo box. Despite the pickup appearance, though, the EXT is all Cadillac, complete with a Bose sound system.

Chevrolet's big news is the 2002 Avalanche, the industry's first configurable truck. The Avalanche is based on the same platform as the Suburban and comes with a fold-flat, midgate and removable rear window, which allows you to carry up to six passengers with a mediumsized cargo floor, 51 inches, or a three-passenger vehicle with a full-sized bed capable of carrying 4-by-8 sheets of plywood.

Astro continues as the only rear- wheel-drive van in its class for the 2002 model year. For the 2002 model year the Astro adds multi-port fuel injection to its 4.3-liter. V-6 engine.

Two-door "Xtreme" Blazer models get few changes for 2002. Perhaps the most noticeable is a new floor-mounted shifter for those with automatic transmis-

Chevrolet's full-size van, the Express, receives a more efficient starter for Vortec 5000. 5700 and 8100 engines but is otherwise unchanged.

S-10's lineup has been simplified with the discontinuation of the 2WD regular-cab. long-box model. The third door will be extended cab models along with air conditioning and tachometers on all retail models. ZR2 decals will be included with all ZR2 widestance packages.

Chevy recently reworked its Silverado pickup, so not much is new for '02 other than a new flexible-fuel system that allows it to run on ethanol-gas mix-

midway through the 2001 model - nothing new since then.

Suburban base trim models have been discounted. Standard LS trim has been upgraded to include heated, self-dimming outside rearview mirrors; sixway power-driver and passenger seats; side steps; an electric rear-window defogger: fog lamps; and a HomeLink transmitter.

Like the Suburban, LS trim on the Tahoe has been upgraded and electronic climate control is available with a sunroof. Also, the premium suspension now is standard on all Tahoes except Z71 models.

2002 the midsize TrailBlazer is new from the ground up and is powered by a 270-horsepower in-line six power plant. The TrailBlazer sits upon the industry's first fully hydroformed SUV frame and a five-link, rear suspension.

Tracker, Chevrolet's compact SUV, will be offered as a base model and in ZR2 and LT trim. Running boards have been deleted for the 2002 model year and an AM/FM/CD sound system now is standard equipment along with a roof rack on fourdoor models.

Dodge enters the 2002 model

year with a number of changes to note.

Both the Dakota compact pickup and the Durango SUV move into 2002 largely the same, except for new SXT models of both vehicles. The SXT is designed to be an entry-level package that still offers a number of popular options. Durango also gets an optional DVD-based entertainment system.

The biggest news of the year at Dodge is the all-new Ram 1500 pickup. Completely redesigned inside and out, the Ram accentuates its most striking feature with an even larger cross-hair grille. The Ram offers two new Magnum engines, a 3.7-liter V-6 and a 4.7-liter V-8.

Ram fans who need bigger vehicles also should know that a redesigned Ram 2500 and 3500 are coming in 2003.

One of just a few full-size vans on the road today, the 2002 Ram Van is largely unchanged from a year ago.

Like other manufacturers. Ford has used 2002 for some new products but mostly for minor changes here and there.

Escape, brand new last year. gets only a few minor tweaks for the 2002 model year.

Ford's Explorer, introduced earlier in the year as a 2002. is all new, with a completely redone interior and independent rear suspension. The new 2002 Explorer offers seating for

Explorer Sport, the three-door version of Ford's best-selling SUV. and Explorer Sport Trac. the half-truck, half-SUV, each continue with minor changes.

Expedition will offer rear seat passengers a little more entertainment with the addition of a (VHS-based) video system.

The biggest sport utility on the block, Excursion gets a power front-passenger seat, automatic climate control and other upgrades for 2002.

F-150, the world's best-selling vehicle, adds another special model for 2002 with the King Ranch Edition, which comes with leather seats, two-tone paint and lots of other creature features as standard equipment.

SVT F-150 Lightings will be available for the 2002 model year for those who like their truck to haul. And it will have 380 horsepower under its hood this year.

Ranger, along with all the other packages, will be available with an FX4 off-road package for 2002. The package features special tires, wheels and suspension for those who take their off-roading a little more seriously.

GM's higher-end truck line. GMC, has a number of changes in store for 2002.

The Envoy, GMC's midsize SUV, is new from the ground up. The 2002 version is powered by a new, inline, six-cylinder engine producing 270 horsepower.

There aren't too many full-size vans still on the road, and GMC's offering, the Savana, enters 2002 largely unchanged.

GMC's full-size pickup, the Sierra, becomes the first conventional truck to offer Quadrasteer, the four-wheel steering system that varies according to vehicle speed. Also, the C3 becomes the Sierra Denali for 2002.

Sonoma, GMC's light pickup. gets a couple of changes for 2002. The once-optional third door on extended cab models becomes standard, while new color and trim packages also are available

GMC's monster of the road, the Yukon, gets many changes, modeling its cousin, the Cadillac Escalade. Also, Yukon gets a new heavy-duty transmission for those with the 8.1-liter engine, while vehicles with the 5.3-liter power plant become flexiblefuel friendly.

Honda has yet to get a new high-end sport utility vehicle. For now it has a revised CR-V, which grows a little larger and gets some additional power under the hood.

Passport stays around as it was last year.

The big news for Hummer won't come until 2003 with the unveiling of the urban-friendly H2, a scaled-down version of the popular go-anywhere vehicle.

Until then, the traditional Hummer gets a few changes for 2002, including new H1 badging, wheels and redesigned center console that

available

with additional and much-needed legroom.

Last year, Korean automaker Hyundai launched its first SUV attempt, the Santa Fe.

Because it is so recent to the market, little on the Santa Fe changes for 2002. All models now will get front and rear disc brakes, and amenities such as power door locks and body-colored mirrors become standard on all versions.

There still is only one SUV offering from Infiniti, the fullsize QX4.

For 2002, the QX4 gets interior freshening, including a new audio system and an optional all-wood steering wheel. Other new features include Intelligent Cruise Control, which uses lasers to maintain a safe distance from the vehicle in front of

The biggest news at Isuzu isn't with a new product, but rather with the death of the VehiCROSS, which never caught on with American buyers.





Among those vehicles still in place, the midsize Axiom was an all-new 2002 released earlier this year. It offers a 230-horsepower, 3.5-liter V-6 and an allwheel-drive system.

Little changes for Isuzu's other three vehicles. The Rodeo and the Trooper both get new trim levels, while the two-door Rodeo Sport is unchanged.

At Jeep, the big news for 2002 \cdot is the passing of the Cherokee and the birth of the smaller Liberty.

Created to fill the company's void with smaller SUVs, the Liberty has the ride and feel that's all Jeep. Liberty comes standard with a 2.4-liter engine, but can be upsized to a 3.7-liter

Grand Cherokee remains on the map for 2002, and changes o include a new Outland model that is loaded with options. Grand Cherokee also gets a new ¹ motor, a 4.7-liter V-8.

A true classic, the Jeep Wrangler gets a new X Model for 2002 with sporty upgrades. Other include improved sound and ventilation systems.

Kia enters the 2002 model year with one SUV offering - the Sportage — that once again is available as either a four-door hardtop or a two-door convert-

Little changes on the Sportage for 2002, except that AC and alloy wheels now are standard. Also, a two-tone package with different cladding and bumpers is available.

Like Cadillac, Lincoln suddenly has a pair of offerings for those who want a lot of luxury with their bigger vehicle.

Blackwood, Lincoln's entry into the world of pickup trucks will be more at home at the country club than the lumberyard. The Blackwood features a carpeted bed with stainless steel accents and a power-operated tonneau cover.

Navigator, Lincoln's full-size, SUV, will be available in a Limited Edition Black Monochrome edition for 2002.

Mazda has made a number of changes in its car lineup for 2002, but that attitude hasn't carried over to its truck and SUV lineup

Little changes for the B-Series light pickup for the new year. Some exterior badging is removed, and on the inside there are subtle changes such as a new armrest

Mazda's SUV, the Tribute, gets even fewer changes. Other than a special DC-V6 edition that will have limited availability, the only significant changes are to a redesigned center console.

Mercedes-Benz ups the ante in the sport utility vehicle world with the introduction of its G500.

Its popular M Class gets a minor facelift and interior upgrades for 2002, and the ML430 is scheduled to be replaced by a more powerful ML500.

Like its cousin, the Ford Mercury's Explorer, Mountaineer was introduced earlier in 2001 as an all-new 2002 model and comes with a new independent rear suspension and third seat.

Little changes in 2002 for Mitsubishi's two-vehicle SUV

With one pickup and two SUVs. Nissan has established itself as a player in the biggervehicle market in recent years.

For 2002, Nissan's compact pickup, the Frontier: gets a number of changes. While the exterior was redesigned a year ago. the interior gets similar treat-ment for 2002, including a new long-bed option on crew cab models. Between cab size, trim level and two- or four-wheeldrive systems, the Frontier now can be had 19 different ways.

Nissan's full-size SUV, the Pathfinder, is largely unchanged except for a new grille and other detail pieces. while the automaker's smaller SUV offering, the Xterra, gets a front end mirroring the Frontier and an supercharged V-6 engine producing 210 horsepow-

Oldsmobile may be riding off into the sunset, but GM decided not to pull the plug on planned redesigns already in the works.

For 2002, that means the Bravada is nearly completely reworked from the ground up with a new platform, new sheet metal and new interior. The new Bravada gets GM's 4.2-liter engine, a hydraformed frame for a quieter ride and a more traditional Olds grille.

Few would argue against some changes to Pontiac's lone SUV offering, the Aztek. Officials listened to a year's worth of criticism and made some of those revisions.





ooking Back

A story from the past.

On July 1, 1939, Constance (Connie) and Don Dresselhouse were married, and from that point on she kept a journal detailing their life together, in particular the many vacations they took.

Connie's journal was submitted by June Jenter of Manchester, whose husband, Ron, is Don Dresselhouse's cousin.

We last saw Don and Connie leaving Florida, where they spent Christmas 1940. In this portion of Connie's journal, the couple sleeps through the dawning of a new year and Connie attends a priest's ordinationWashington.

We stayed in Lakeland that night and it was pretty cool. In fact, compared to Miami, it was downright cold. You would never know it was the same state. However, it was more Christmassy there. They had prizes for the best decorated yards, etc. We stayed at the New Florida Hotel and it was a lovely place.

Lakeland is where the Tigers train, but none of them were there yet. We passed through the orange grove country and near the Bach tower at night, so really couldn't see much. We did stop and pick up one orange from the ground, though—expecting a seat full of buckshot at any moment. We had bought a big bag of oranges to bring back with us; also one of grapefruit.

We made our way up through Florida the next day and through Georgia and North Carolina. Darkness was beginning to fall and we were in the mountains, so we stopped at the first town which we hit-Connersville. That was really a mountain town! The hotel was very poor-and not too clean. I was rather glad we were on the ground floor in case the doggone thing caught fire. We left early the next day and drove through the rest of the mountains.

This was New Year's Eve.and we listened to other celebrations throughout the country on the radio. We really wanted to go as far as we could but by 11:30 p.m. I was so tired I just couldn't go another step, so we stopped in Greenville, Ohio. It was very dark and we saw a small hotel so stopped there. We were both asleep before 12 o'clock sounded.

The next morning we started out to find a restaurant and saw a much nicer hotel up the street. However, by that time we didn't much care as we were on our last leg. We were only about 150 miles from Manchester so got there in good time, rested awhile and then made the 100-mile jaunt home.



We really had a grand vacation and crammed our two weeks chuck full of everything Florida had to offer.

We really settled down for a while again. Just being ordinary married folks-playing bridge with Mother and Dad. spending weekends in Ann Arbor and Manchester and going to Moonlight Gardens with Jim and Helen.

Then before we knew it, June rolled around and I was to go to Washington to see Harry ordained-and then on to Bridgeport for his first mass.

Don and Dad took Mother and I to Toledo where we met Bill. Bill had driven up from Mobile and was to drive us to Washington. We met Bill at the hotel without any difficulty and had some breakfast, . whereupon Bill made a dash for church. He had rented a room for the night-which turned into a small apartment. We finally got on our way about noon and Dad and Don took off for Detroit and a ball game.

We had an uneventful ride through Ohio-through typical Sunday traffic. We intended to take the Pennsylvania turnpike all the way through and entered the turnpike about 9 p.m. You can take any curve there at 70 and Bill was trying to prove you could take them at 80. too.

We stopped along the way for a sandwich and cup of coffee. The turnpike is really quite a highway. Some of the tunnels go through the mountains and are over a mile long. There are seven tunnels in all. We stopped in Gettysburg although it'was altogether too late to see anything of the battlefields. and Bill tried a hotel. He was unsuccessful there, though, so we went on to a small town called Westminster. Md.

for ourselves and Father Lawlor. John and his mother had gone over to Virginia to the races where, incidentally, he won \$250. We had a wonderful dinner at the Commodore and had a drink there, too. By that time, of course, we didn't want to go to bed, so Mother, Bill, Father Lawlor and I went to the movies. We saw a good show and had a lot of fun.

I was awakened at midnight and found Mother sitting by the window watching a fire. It was really a good one, too, although it seemed about eight or ten blocks away.
