### MICHIGAN GAME PLANS AROUSE **WIDE INTEREST**

Michigan's scientific encouragement and study of game animals and birds at the Williamston game project in Ingham county has aroused wide interest among individuals and state authorities elsewhere, according to reports by Harry F. Harper of Lansing, president of the Michigan Izaak Walton league, and Professor H. M. Wight of the School of Forestry and Conservation in the University of

Eight different states have recently sought the advice of Professor Wight on the management of game projects planned along the Michigan lines, and he has served as consultant on the improvement of several thousand acres devoted to wild life welfare in various parts of the country. In Michigan eight tracts of land have been carefully mapped for game management purposes and 100,000 trees and food. By the middle of June, accord- cade a. ing to Professor Wight, 5,000 acres in Michigan will be improved with extensive hedgerow developments and the planting of patches of food

The Williamstone Game Management project, sponsored by the Michigan division of the Izaak Walton league, the State Department of Conservation and the University of Michigan School of Forestry and Conservation, and carried on with the cooperation of farm land owners in Ingham county, aims to study in which wild life thrives best. The practical methods evolved may then be applied in other parts of the state, bringing back and maintaining Michibirds, animals and other wild life.



#### GIANT AZTEC BEAN




The above illustration was reproduced from an actual photograph, to show the compar-aive size of the Giant Aztec Bean with that of the common field or navy bean.

# **MUST REPORT**

Corporation report blanks for 1932 are to be mailed to about 18,000 Michigan corporations during the last week in June, it was announced by the corporation division of the department of state. The total 1931 privilege tax paid up to June 4, 1932, was \$6,864,277.94.

The reports, accompanied by the 1932 corporation privilege tax can be paid to the department between July 1 and Sept. 1. While the report differs but slightly from the 1931 blank, the present year is the first in which the corporation code adopted by the 1931 legislature (P. A. 327) is fully effective and laws governing the tax and the annual report are changed in many technical ways.

In an effort to aid the corporations, the 1932 blanks will be accompanied by printed instructions, outlining the changes in the law.

In addition to the 18,000 profit corporations in the state there are approximately 7,000 other corporations that are not required to pay the privlege fee. These include non-profit corporations, which starting in 1933, must make yearly reports ,and socalled utility corporations such as railroads, telegraph and telephone companies.







Barley puts gains on beef cattle faster than either corn or oats, but pork, according to figures from the past year's feeding tests at Michigan State College, which were presented to the group of livestock men who attended Feeders' Day.

The gains made by beef on ground barley were also cheaper than the pounds of meat made by feeding corn or oats. Pigs made their cheapest gains on whole wheat in the college trials. All costs of gain were computed by charging all grains at 75 cents per hundredweight plus a 10cent charge for each hundred pounds of ground feed.

### DISCOVER ANCIENT FILING SYSTEMS

Rows of metal filing drawers in a modern office have an ancient history, archeology now proves, by discovering in Mesopotamia, "cradle of civilizaltion," a series of bronze cylinders, neatly sealed, which were used to contained rolled-up parchment and papyrus documents of the time of Christ and before.

This discovery is only one of many made on the site of abandoned Seleucia, on the Tigrus river, by the point expedition of the University of Michigan and the Cleveland and Tolede museums of art, showing that the people in this old center of human culture lived, traded, kept house, gambled, played, loved and worshipped very much like their successor in modern London and New York.

In its hey-dey it was a city of 600,-000 persons, lying twenty miles from present day Bagdad. Beneath the ruins Professor LeRoy Waterman of the University of Michigan expects to find the still more ancient Sumerian city of Akshak. It was on this site that Seleucus Nicator, one of the generals of Alexander the Great, set up his capital after the death of Alexander. The place was renamed Seleucia and throve for centuries as the trading center between China, India, Persia and Arabia and the western world bordering the Mediterranean. Though ruled in succession by the Seleucid Dynasty, hardy Parthians from North Persia and the Roman Emperor Trajan, the city did not decline until 200 A. D. and is one of the most important historical sites in the near East, marking the place where the Oriental and western worlds met.
